HE SAW A VISION.

Mr. Charles Edgar DeWolfe of Windsor writes the Halifax Chronicle that a Mr. James E. Rafuse of Windsor tells him that on 13th June he saw a vision of the King which to his mind indicated that the coronation would be postponed. Mr. Rafuse is described as a temperate, industrious man calm, serious, self-possessed and a clever merchant, who works in his shop as a cabinet maker, picture framer and taxidermist, and the story of what he saw is thus told:

In the evening he was working in his back shop (in the rear of which is a clear space) when, about ten o'clock he suddenly saw outside his shop a figure clad in pure white with a crown, which looked as if it were composed of gold upon its head, advancing toward him. Mr. Rafuse was naturally much astonished and watched the advancing figure, which grew gradually taller and taller, and the white garb also grew whiter and whiter and the gold crown glowed and sparkled more brightly, contrasting strangely with the darkness of the night as the figure drew nearer and nearer. Mr. Rafuse thought the figure was about to enter the open door of his shop and sprang back a step or two, but it disappeared, sinking gradually, and apparently into the earth.

It is rare that we have a well-authenticated vision in these latter days, and the facts in regard to this one are so circumstantially stated that they are calculated to challenge our attention. Assuming the entire veracity of Mr. Rafuse, some questions will naturally arise in the minds of thoughtful readers who may peruse his story. Did he really see what he thought he saw? Was it a freak of his imagination? Did the so-called vision foreshadow anything with regard to King Edward's coronation being about to be postponed? Why was the revelation, if such it was, made at the time and in the place it was and to the person of Mr. Rafuse? These and many more questions will suggest themselves to the mind of the inquirer. It is to be observed that the story is told by Mr. DeWolfe to the press after the actual postponement of the coronation, but it appears to have been related by Mr. Rafuse to his wife and a friend as early as the 16th or 17th of June, and before the serious illness of the King had been made public.

And yet the story is a very remarkable one when examined carefully. There are many persons in the world who live a sort of dreamy existence, to whom the actualities of life are largely unreal and to whom the dreams of the night or the pictures conjured up by their imaginations in the day time seem about as real as anything that occurs. If Mr. Rafuse happens to be of this considerable class the explanation of the incident would be comparatively easy. Everybody

was thinking and talking much at that time about the coronation. There had been sinister predictions that His Majesty would not live to be crowned. Mr. Rafuse was, moreover, a picture framer, and probably had then in his shop one or more portraits of the King perched with the crown of gold upon his head. Suddenly he turned to look out into the darkness, and his imagination did the rest. From thinking of the King he came to think he saw a crowned figure in the darkness. What if it should advance to enter the shop? And thereupon it did so advance. He shrank back and the figure faded out and sank into the ground.

A clever conjuror once attempted to play upon the imagination of the crowd in a London street beside which was a colossal figure of the British lion carved in stone. The conjuror stopped and in simulated amazement gazed upon the lion. Passers by stopped to wonder what it was that had evidently startled him. He continued to gaze upon the lion, then shouted, "He lifts his paw! he lifts his paw!" The crowd with their attention thus quickly directed to the forefront and tail of the lion, both of which were elevated, were made to believe that the stone figure had moved, and did not suspect for some time that they had been imposed upon by a trick. In our dreams we think we see many strange and startling things which in reality have no existence and are merely pictures presented to or called forth by the imagination of the sleeper. We doubt not that what Mr. Rafuse saw, or thought he saw was quite as unsubstantial and as devoid of significance as those dreams and visions of the night which are evoked when reason sleeps and the imagination is not controlled by either the will or the intellect.

The Government of France has given official assurances that it will facilitate in every way the transfer to the United States of the title to the Panama Canal held by the Panama Canal Company. It will take time however, to verify the company's title, and to secure the requisite land grants or long leases from the State of Columbia, whose territory is traversed by the canal route.

It is intimated that from the failure to secure reciprocity with the United States large masses of the Cuban people may be reduced to destitution, and may have to accept relief from abroad. The New York Herald's Havana correspondent telegraphed a few days ago that "the country is faced by financial destitution and that it is folly to attempt to deny or refute the extreme precariousness of the situation. Many sugar estates are suspending work, even the largest are dismissing every employe that it is possible to spare, and growing stagnation is the report of merchants and bankers everywhere. This is all so different from what the Cuban people were led to expect that it must create an unfavorable feeling among them even toward the great nation which freed them from the Spanish yoke. The American people at large desire to see the Cubans treated generously, but the sugar trust appears to be too powerful to be controlled by popular sentiment."
