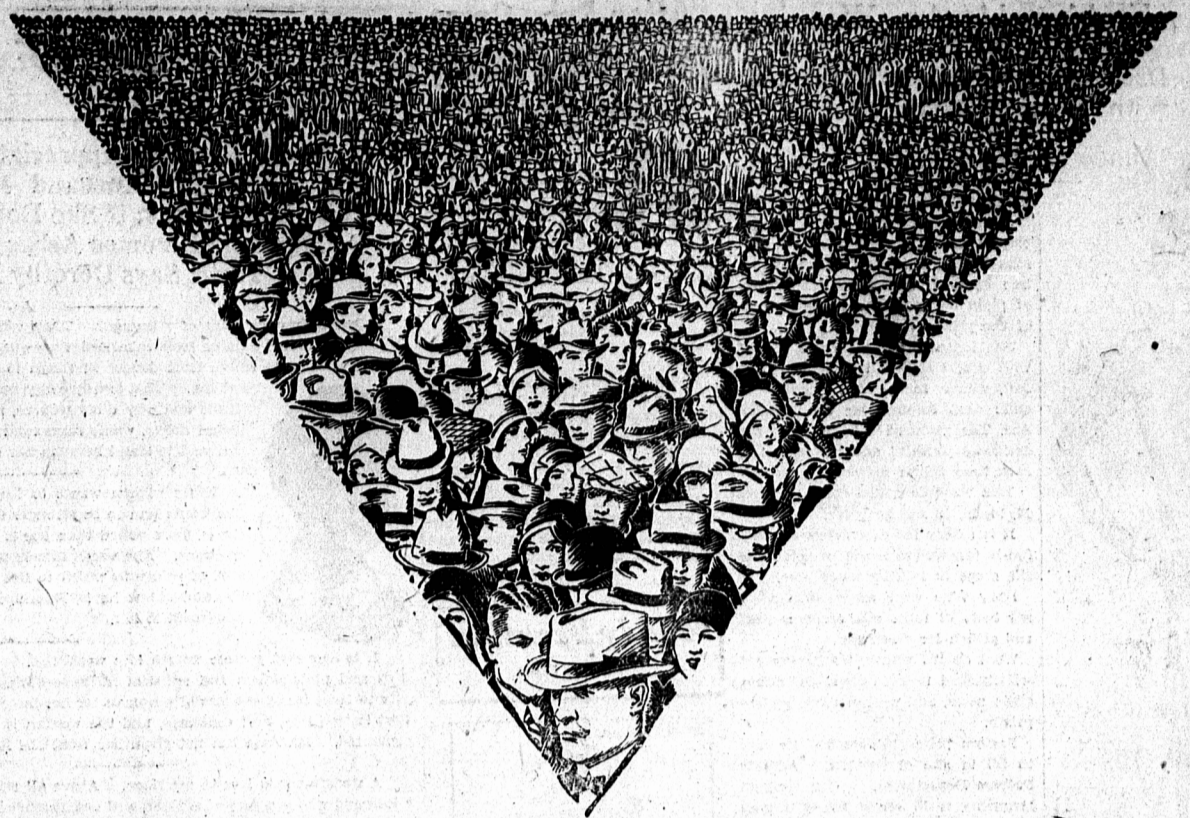

CONTINENT WIDE SEARCH FOR ALDERMAN BROWN

(Special to the Guardian) STRATFORD, Jan. 17.-At least \$23,000 in bonds is alleged to have been stolen by Tom Brown, missing Stratford Alderman and trusted partner for whom wide search is being conducted. A police circular sent today to the police departments of ninety seven cities on this continent lists thirty separate bonds as "some of the bonds stolen by Tom Brown." The circular describes Brown as thirty six years old, height six feet, erect carriage, weight 190 pounds, black hair, long full face, dark complexion and a good dresser. It is stated that he may be driving a LaSalle sedan, 1929 license number 230-513.

While the minimum amount of missing securities as stated in the circular is \$23,000 it is understood here that the total may reach more than \$100,000.

LIVESTOCK MARKET

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Jan. 21.-There were 182 cattle, 166 calves, 236 hogs and boom,

107 sheep and lambs for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today.

The cattle market was steady at \$3.25 for canners to \$4.50 for cutters. Plain and medium cows brought from \$5.00 to \$6.25. Calves were mostly all veals of common to fair quality. One small lot of good veals brought \$15.00 and the balance of the veal between \$10.00 and \$13.00. Ewes and wethers were sold for \$11.00 with ducks and culls at \$8.00. Hogs were unchanged at \$12.10 to \$13.25 fed and watered flat. About 50 hogs were sold on grade for \$13.25 for hogs with \$1.00 premium per hog on select, and cuts of off grades. Sows were from \$11.00 to \$11.50 with an odd one at \$12.00.
