A MISTAKEN NOTION.

A somewhat wearisome controversy has been going on in the party press for some time past as to which party we are indebted to for securing the construction of the Hillsboro Bridge and the Belfast and Murray Harbor Railway. These works will be begun by appropriations made by Liberal Governments at Charlottetown and Ottawa. But they have had earnest advocates among the men of the Conservative party also.

It is however an altogether mistaken notion to give too much credit to either party or to any set of men for the works in question. It is not of their own money that Sir Louis Davies, Mr. Farquharson or Messrs. Martin and McDonald propose to build the bridge and the railway. It is the money of the people of Canada, our own money, that is to pay for these and all other public works. The money of the people has been for years past and is being expended with a free hand for railways, works and buildings in all portions of the Dominion. In that regard the West has been always much better cared for than the East.

We are about to get a part, and a part only, of our share in the general distribution. No doubt our public men have a hard fight in securing for us our fair share of what is going for our people are few and isolated, and our voting strength in Parliament is very small. It is regrettable that in their long term of power the Conservative Government were so neglectful of this Island Province. It is regrettable that the Liberal press should now assume that the Government of the day have become exceptionally generous toward us. The Island is clearly entitled to all it is getting or is likely to get, and more besides.

Next Monday, Labor Day, being a statutory holiday, THE MORNING GUARDIAN will not be issued.

It is funny to read in a section of the U. S. press the strong expressions of sympathy for the Boers against British "bullying" and "land-grabbing." A like charitable judgment on the British and Canadian side might find something to say for the Filipinos.

It is claimed that Cuba, under U. S. military rule produced a surplus of \$1,500,000 during the past six months notwithstanding that \$300,000 was expended in charity and \$2,000,000 in sanitary measures.

A Boston paper mentions among the fortunes earned by lucky patentees that a dentist has obtained a patent for something new in crown and bridge work out of which he expects to make three million dollars in royalties from all the dentists in the land.

The Boston Record says that "in Cuba the only southern men who gained any glory during the late war were the colored regulars, who came to the rescue of the Rough Riders and got them out of their predicament. We are glad the colored men are going to Manila."

Lord Kitchener praises the bridge built by American contractors for the Soudan railway across the Atbara River, and calls it "a magnificent structure." He further says the bridge is due to the energy, ability and power of Americans to turn out works of magnitude in less time than any one else, and congratulates them on their success in the erection of a bridge in the heart of Africa, so far from home and in the hottest period of the year. This is warm praise from a disinterested and important source.

Sir Michael Hicks Beach, Chancellor of the Exchequer, is being severely criticised by the English press for the sale of an estate near Salisbury Plain to his own Government at an exorbitant price. The ground will be used for militia manoeuvres, and the price paid is \$467,000. It is so rare that jobbery is charged in connection with public purchases or contracts in the Mother Country that this incident attracts unusual attention.

Hon. Mr. Strong's Will.

The will of the late Honorable Wm. G. Strong, to which reference was made in yesterday's issue of THE GUARDIAN and which has recently been registered in the Probate Court, was made on the 5th of October, 1897 and disposes of the deceased's estate as follows:—

1. He appoints his three sons Frederick W., Charles Edward and Henry Pope, as the executors.
2. He bequeaths to his widow his dwelling house in Summerside, with its contents for her life, and at her death the property goes to his daughter, Mary Allison Strong. He also gives his widow a living out of the business conducted by him in Summerside.
3. A bequest to John B. Strong of the dwelling house and buildings occupied by him and the sum of two thousand dollars.
4. To Frederick William Strong the dwelling house in which he then resided in Summerside, and also the store and premises on the corner of Water and Central Streets in Summerside, and the warehouse and lot used as a lumber yard at the west end of Summerside; also the dwelling house and lot on the south side of Front Street, Summerside; also the residue of the estate remaining after the legacies are paid.
5. To Charles Edward Strong one thousand dollars.
6. To his daughter Sarah Louisa Wright, the premises known as Strong's Corner, Beedeque, and the goods, etc., now in the store and the sum of \$944; also the book debts due him in respect of that business.
7. To Mary Allison Strong four thousand dollars.
8. To his son Robert Newton Strong, one thousand five hundred dollars, to be invested for him and the interest paid him.
9. To Henry Pope Strong all the Bank Stock held by testator in Summerside Bank, and a mortgage for \$1,000; also a deposit receipt for \$1,000 and \$2,000 to be paid out of the estate.
