Supreme Court Building Badly Damaged

By yesterday afternoon the Court House building at Summerside was almost back to normal following the fire which had broken out in the attic the previous evening. Gallons of water had been poured into the attic and had come down through the ceilings almost inundating some of the offices. The jail staff and some of the prisoners worked through the night mopping up water and by yesterday afternoon little evidence of the fire remained.

The Supreme Court room is the only part of the building that suffered permanent damage from water and it is thought that the ceiling of that room may have to be replaced. The main fire damage was caused in two sections of the attic around the cupola and on the north west end where the fire broke through the roof. The cupola is badly damaged and will have to be replaced or removed. Workmen were busy yesterday effecting temporary repairs to the roof. The origin of the fire has still not been determined but it is thought that it likely started from the wiring. There was a direct wire to the cupola where the A.R.P. siren had been located during the war. If the fire had broken out at night and gained headway before the fire was discovered, the jailer's family and the members of the R.C.M.P. who have their barracks on that third floor would have been in serious danger as there is no fire escape on the building. — S.
