Maple Leafs Retain Leadership By 3-1 Win Over Black Hawks

SATURDAY'S GAME

TORONTO, Dec. 3—(CP)—Syl Apps may or may not be the greatest centre in hockey history, but give the big fellow wingers as smart as Gord Drillon and B.B. Davidson and anything is liable to happen at any time.

The dynamite line which Manager Conn Smythe wouldn't trade for any three in the National Hockey League sparked a sensational third period rally to give Toronto Maple Leafs a 3-3 overtime tie with Chicago Black Hawks here Saturday night.

Apps, centre of a recent controversy over all-time greats, led the drive in which the league-leading Leafs overcame a three goal deficit to force extra play. He started the manoeuvre for Toronto's first goal by Drillon and scored the second himself 11 seconds before Davidson tied the count.

A crowd of 11,388 paid customers saw their favorites fight out from the verge of what threatened to be their first defeat on home ice this season. Commanding the play in the first period, the Hawks counted twice, and added another in the second.

With Lex Chisholm in the penalty box for holding early in the first period, the Hawks clicked on their first gang attack. Diz Desilets converting a pass from Cully Dahlstrom. Before the period half-way mark, Mush March scored on a passout from behind the Leaf net. Art Wiebe made the play after carrying the puck the length of the ice.

The Leafs failed to get organized in the middle section and most of their rushes crumbled at the Chicago defence. Content to protect their lead the Hawks made few goalward thrusts, but got better results when they did. Late in the period George Allen made it 3-0 on a pass from Bill Carse.

Play roughed up early in the third period and March and Davidson went off together after a gushing bout. With both teams short-handed the Leafs entered the score column. In typical Drillon style, the league's top scorer barged in from the right boards and blasted a hard shot past goalie Mike Karakas.

The Leafs ganged continually and after hemming the Hawks behind their own blueline for almost a minute, Apps brought the Leafs within one goal of their rivals. Eleven seconds later in another power play, Bucko McDonald fired a low shot from just inside the blueline and Davidson deflected the puck into the net.

Bruins Take 6-2 Victory From Amerks

NEW YORK, Dec. 3—(CP)—Herbie Cain and Mel Hill fired two goals each tonight to pace Boston Bruins to an impressive 6-2 National Hockey League victory over New York Americans.

Held in check for one period, the Bruins skated away from the tiring Americans in the second and third periods to set up an impregnable defence except for one short space in the last period when Harvey Jackson netted two American goals. They were Jackson's third and fourth goals in three games.

The Bruins, apparently in full stride after a slow opening of the season, built up a 2-0 lead in the second period as Hill and Cain scored. As the Americans attacked with five men at the start of the final period they left their defence wide open and Cain and Bauer scored on a four-goal margin.

Jackson shot the first of his goals in 11:20 and the second, on Charley Conacher's rebound, only 16 seconds later. But Hill and Roy Cnoacher got those back swiftly and only Earl Robertson's goalending prevented Boston running the total to double figures.

Montreal Canucks Resume Stride To Down Detroit Red Wings For 3-0 Score

DETROIT, Dec. 3—(CP)—Goalie Claude Bourque marked up his second shutout of the National Hockey League campaign tonight as Montreal Canucks regained winning form to defeat Detroit Red Wings 3-0.

The victory boosted the Canucks point total to 12, one more than New York Rangers whose draw with the Americans last night shoved the Habitués temporarily into third place. It also brought the Montrealers revenge for the 6-4 lacing Detroit, gave them a week ago last night.

After a rugged but scoreless first period, Canucks took the lead by counting twice in the second session Johnny Gagnon, veteran forward, put his team in front in the second period on a close in shot making a double relay from Walter Buswell and Paul Haynes.

Late in the period Marty Barry, who came to Canucks this season when he was released by the Red Wings, climaxed an ably executed play in which Ray Geillie and Charlie Sands also figured by scoring the second goal.

Canadians' final score came half way through the third period, Sands counting on a breakaway with Geillie and Barry.

Evidence of Bourque's fine goal-tending was shown in the fact that he made 46 saves while Tiny Thomson had only 23 shots on his nets. The little goalie was at his best in the second half of the game when four five Detroit forwards peppered him constantly.

The game was rough and no bodychecks were spared but it was clean and the only penalty called went to Duane Trudel in the third period after he punched Jimmy Orlando, Detroit defenceman.
