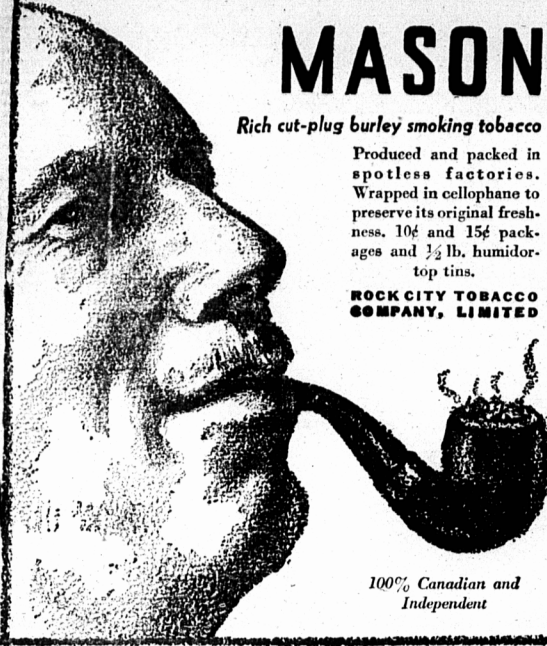

DELEGATES URGE STATE MEDICINE

REGINA, April 16—(CP)—Urging a system of state medicine for Saskatchewan, Dr. S. E. Moore, president of the State Hospital and medical League, heading a delegation, submitted figures to members of the government here. Average annual cost of hospital and medical services to rural residents, he said, was \$8.42, and on this basis a system of state medicine or health insurance would cost \$8,420,000 a year.

The government would contribute slightly less than \$2,000,000 of this, he said, or no more than the government was now spending for medical and hospital aid for a portion of the province. Figures submitted are based on information compiled by Dr. Moore from data secured in replies to 100,000 questionnaires sent to farmers with the co-operation of the Wheat Pool. Data was compiled from 5,495 replies in which complete answers were given to all questions. These showed costs incurred for medical service amounted to \$1,096,101, of which \$660,938.25, or 60.3 per cent, was paid and \$3.25 still owing. He said these figures, with perhaps a few isolated exceptions, refer to farmers who were not on relief and were endeavoring to pay their own way, and that a very large percentage of the population of the province were in the same plight as those families.

That Body of Yours

By James W. Bayton, M.D. A FAULTY POSTURE AFFECTS YOU MENTALLY AND PHYSICALLY

A magazine story some years ago told of the efforts of the wife of a young civil engineer to help him reach the top in his profession. They moved to a fashionable suburban neighborhood, joined the golf and other clubs, and dressed themselves well. She then invited a wealthy friend who was engaged in extensive building operations to visit them and managed to get this friend and her husband together for a number of hours.

However, nothing came of these efforts and they had to move into a small flat in the city and he took a position with a construction firm who were building subways for underground railways. By showing his employers how an even better service could be given the city by changing the routes slightly he was able to save the firm hundreds of thousands of dollars. He was taken into the firm on the instant.

As he emerged from the interview to go home someone slapped him on the back and said, "Well, my boy, you've certainly made good." It was the manufacturing friend on whom his wife had built high hopes.

As he looked at this friend and at his own almost shabby clothes, he could not understand how his friend had discovered his success; success which had been attained just ten minutes before.

"How did you know I'd succeed?" I don't look it." "I knew you had made good by the way you were walking—head up, chest out, a long stride—buoyancy

in your every move." Now does this erect posture have any effect upon the body aside from its helpful effect on the mind?

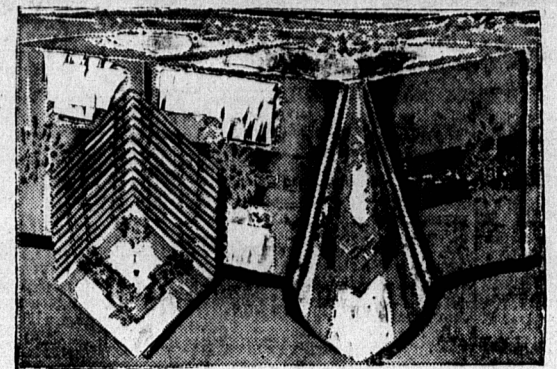
Dr. L. B. Laplace and J. T. Nicholson, in American Journal of Medical Sciences, tell of their studies of a group of males and females who had been trained in their ability to correct defects in posture—position of spinal column, round shoulders, sway back, drooping head. All observations were taken the same day on each person, so that the actual difference between body conditions when standing in the "correct" position and in the "faulty" position could be noted. The following observations were made:

The size and position of the lungs, of heart, of the depth of the diaphragm (floor or chest) in taking a long breath, the amount of air in lungs, amount of oxygen going in and out, blood pressure, and pulse. The benefits obtained from standing in the correct position were most striking. The chest took in more air; breathing was slower and deeper; blood pressure, pulse rate, and circulation of the blood were greatly improved. Even if you have no spinal defects, a slouchy posture can interfere with the proper working of heart, lungs, and circulation of blood.

We should all sit and stand "tall."

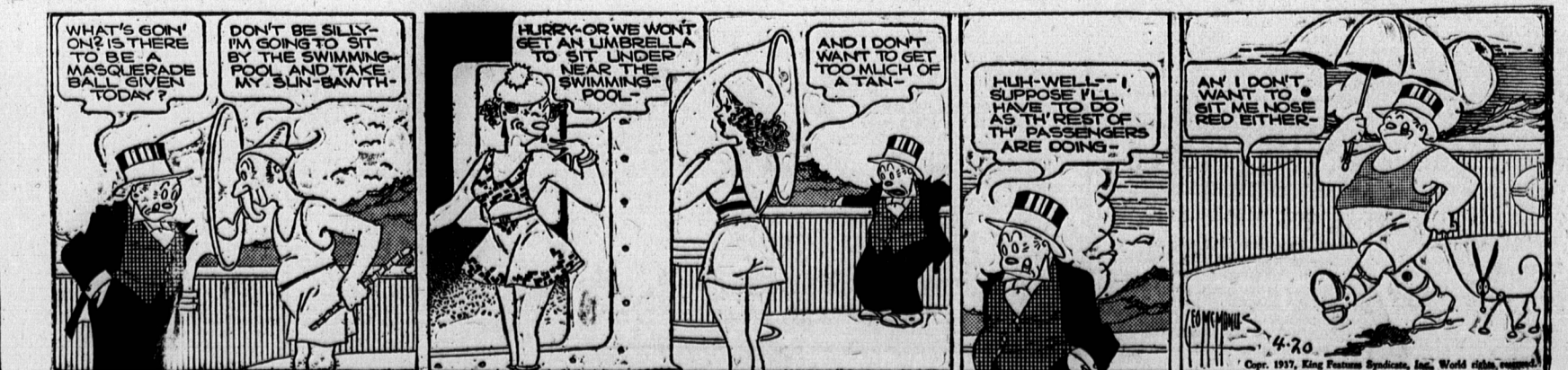
