Field Crop Competition

The competition in fields of standing grain which has been carried on by the Department of Agriculture for the past number of years is to be conducted again for this season on a system similar to last year.

Since the inauguration of this Competition, the improvement in the grain crops of the Province has been remarkable. The objects of such work can be enumerated as follows:

To stimulate an interest in the production of pure, clean seed of the best varieties of our farm crops, to encourage and assist those who are engaged in growing seed grain, to direct the attention of the general farming public to the value of clean seed and better methods of cultivation.

The acceptance of all the objects is becoming more general as the work becomes more established. With the increase of entries and a better fulfillment of the objects, the trade for seed grain has grown, both within and beyond the provincial limits.

As a means of insuring a reliable stand of grain, the growing must keep in touch with the treatment of the seed and the soil, and it is encouraging a greater number of competitors are showing an interest in the selection of seed; the purity of the variety; the treatment of seed for smut; and the detailed work that must be undertaken to insure the highest degree of efficiency.

Objects.

The objects of the competition may be cited as follows:

- 1. To stimulate an interest in the production of pure, clean seed of the best varieties of our farm crops. 2. To encourage and assist those who are engaged in growing seed grain. 3. To show the value of seed selection and the proper cultivation of the soil. 4. To direct the attention of the general farming public to the value of pure, clean seed and better methods of cultivation.

Competitions.

Three competitions will be held in each county, in each of which the following cash prizes will be offered:

Oats.—1, \$10; 2, \$9; 3, \$8; 4, \$7; 5, \$6.50; 6, \$6; 7, \$5.50; 8, \$5; 9, \$4.50; 10, \$4; 11, \$3.50; 12, \$3; 13, \$2.50; 14, \$2.

Wheat.—1, \$8; 2, \$7; 3, \$6; 4, \$5; 6, \$3; 7, \$2.

Barley.—1, \$6; 2, \$4; 3, \$3; 4, \$2.

West Prince shall include the First Electoral District and Lots 7 and 8. East Prince shall include the Fourth and Fifth Electoral Districts, and Lot 18. Middle Prince shall include the remainder of Prince County.

West Queens shall include the First Electoral District and Lot 23. Middle Queens shall include that part of Queens County lying north and west of the Hillsborough River not included in West Queens. South Queens shall include that part of Queens County lying south and east of the Hillsborough River.

East Kings shall include Lots 42, 43, 44, 45, 46, 47, 55 and 56. South Kings shall include Lots 59, 61, 63, 64 and Georgetown Royalty. West Kings shall include the remainder of Kings County.

Rules and Regulations.

- 1. A field of oats shall consist of at least five acres; of wheat, three acres; and of barley at least two acres. 2. An entry fee of one dollar will be charged, if only one kind of grain is entered, and an additional fee of fifty cents for each additional kind of grain. 3. The entry fee must be sent in with the entry. 4. No field will be judged unless the entry fee is paid before the time of judging. 5. Members of the Banner Oat Club should have all fields from which grain for seed will be sold properly inspected while standing. 6. Members of the C. S. G. A. are requested to enter one or more fields in the competition. 7. Competitors should give the Department at least one week's notice when the fields will be ready to cut. 8. Entries should be made to the Provincial Department of Agriculture, Charlottetown, and should arrive not later than August 23rd. The following score card is used in judging the fields; general appearance considered: Stand of crop, uniformity of growth, acyreness of seed, absence of lodging, freedom from weeds, freedom from smut, rust, blight and insects, apparent yield and quality of grain considering: (1) Proportion of well-filled head of plump grain of good quality, (2) Uniformity of maturity, Total.

Will Canada Cancel Her Credit to Rumania?

OTTAWA, Aug. 11.—The threat of the United States to withdraw her credit from Rumania, is watched with great interest in Ottawa. Rumania's refusal to obey the committee of the four great powers at Paris, and abandon her successful military campaign which has won her Budapest, may cause the Allies to take military action against her equivalent to a state of war.

[What would happen to Canada's credit of \$25,000,000 to her in that event, is problematical. It is understood that about \$10,000,000 worth of these goods have actually been shipped, and that another \$10,000,000 worth has been allotted out in orders now in Canadian factories and exporters. No decision has been taken yet in regard to the withdrawal of Canada's credit to the little monarchy, but the trade commission in London, to which Mr. Lloyd Harris has just returned, is in close communication with the British Government in connection with the subject.

Britain Will Punish All Profiteering

LONDON, August 12.—The House of Commons tonight passed the second reading of the Government Bill providing for prosecution and penalties for persons guilty of profiteering. The vote was 251 to 8. Sir Auckland Geddes in moving the second reading of the bill related the story of a north England manufacturer who said to him, "I am perfectly ashamed of the profits I am making." He added that although he had reduced prices below those of his competitors he had made 200,000 pounds profit. Sir Auckland said that shoes which sold at wholesale at from 15 to 25 shillings sold even in the unfashionable districts at from 50 to 60 shillings.
