Mrs. A. E. Newsome, Chicago, arrived in the city yesterday evening and will spend some weeks visiting in the province.

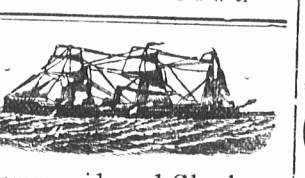
L. B. Miller leaves Monday on a trip to Cape Breton, points in Nova Scotia, Boston and New York. He will be absent several weeks.



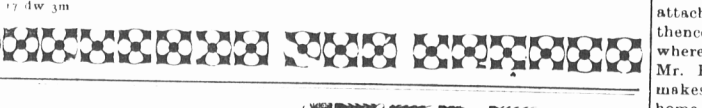
