THE CALEDONIAN SPORTS AT SUMMERSIDE YESTERDAY

Large Attendance to Witness the Display of Island Muscle—Fourteen Carloads from Charlottetown—The Highland Brigade Included—Full List of the Prize-winners.

The annual Scottish Gathering which was held on the Summerside Driving Park yesterday was one of the most successful in the history of the Gathering of the Clans in this Province. The weather was perfect. Besides the crowds who came to town by teams and by regular train, the special train from Charlottetown brought 14 cars crowded. The parade from the Railway Station was a very creditable one as was the affair all through. The best of order was maintained and much interest taken in the events. Worth's Band, Charlottetown, furnished music for the occasion.
