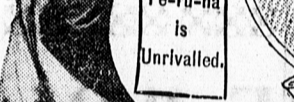

HARTFORD, Conn., September 6.—The finish of the \$10,000 Charter Oak stake race on which four heats were trotted yesterday when Sadie Mac the favorite dropped dead on the track, was the most interesting event on the card for to-day's racing at Charter Oak Park. In the heats trotted yesterday Zephyr and Angolia each won two victories and it was expected that one more heat to-day would decide the race. The hour set for the start of the unfinished event was one o'clock. Other races on the programme are the 2:04 and the 2:12 trotting and 2:08 pace. Among racing men to-day the opinion was general that the tedious scoring which preceded the first heat of the Charter Oak stake was partly responsible for the death of Sadie Mac. She was insured in Lloyds, of London, for \$15,000 the price for which her owner, Miss Katherine L. Wilks of Galv., Ont., bought her a year ago from E. E. Smathers, of New York. Her racing career began two years ago at Charter Oak Park as a three year old and has never been beaten in a race. The mare has won \$13,250 this season, and as a three year old won about \$38,000 in stakes and purses. She was not entered in any races last season. After making a record of 2:06 1/2 in a race at Grosse Pointe, Detroit, early this season, an offer of \$30,000 was made for her but she was not for sale. She afterwards reduced the record a quarter of a second in competition at Readville.
