NOMINEE FOR MODERATOR SHIP.—The Halifax Chronicle says: On Tuesday afternoon, in the hall of the Presbyterian church in this city, by mandate of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, the Presbytery of Halifax and Lunenburg, in connection with the Presbyterian Church in Canada, met for organization and inauguration of business. It was constituted by Dr. C. M. Kerr, of Halifax, who was himself elected Moderator to the end of 1927. The Rev. D. O. Mackay, of Elmsdale, N. S., was chosen Clerk for the same term. The Rev. Dr. Robert Johnston, of Westminister Church, New Glasgow, N. S., was the nominee of this Presbytery for the Moderatorship of the General Assembly, to meet in Knox Church, Stratford, Ont., in June 1927. The Presbytery gave its cordial approval to the expansion of the work of the Halifax Presbyterian Church in the north and of the city. Miss Susie Sylvester, a trained and experienced Deaconess, is to give her services in connection with this advance movement.

Plain red wine discovered late during their stay in the United States is responsible for the improved showing of the French Davis Cup players in the American championships, as compared with their work in the finals against America.

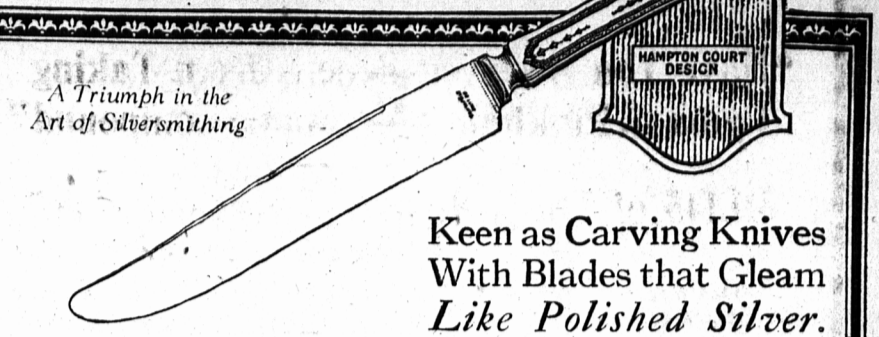
