told that good times were coming," he said, "but they have not come, and I cannot honestly say they are coming. Tariffs would provide work and tariffs will come, but tariffs alone will not restore Britain's imperatively-needed export trade. The only way to obtain that is to reduce the prodigious national expenditure and high wage costs."

Sir Walter Runciman, ship owner, contends that Britain will never be prosperous until the present "badly drafted and badly applied act giving unemployment doles," is amended or repealed, with those acts responsible for unsmooth finance, or overtaxing trade out of existence by abnormal death duties and other taxes.

Lord Incheape, another ship owner, says the country is to a great extent in the hands of trade unionists, and unless they realize Britain's economic position in the arena of international competition Britain will come to grief, and the trade unions with her. "The adoption of a more wholesome policy," he added, "will instantly prove the country sound at heart, and I do not think we shall ever fall into the abyss of communism."

William Howarth, president of the Master Cotton Spinners Association, said the chief problem of British spinners is to reduce production costs so as to enable consumers, mainly agriculturists, to buy freely.

The Laborite A. A. Purcell, secretary of Manchester Trades Council, believes the day of prosperity will yet dawn for Lancashire, whose textile industry was one of the worst hit by the world's industrial depression. "Over-production and unemployment, those formidable phenomena of the present crisis," he said, "will themselves compel those economic and political changes which will establish conditions for renewed industrial activity."

W. Sherwood, president of the Federation of Engineering and Shipbuilding Employees, says the outlook is brighter owing to the construction of new giant Cunarders, advancement of the Admiralty's ship building programme, and the fact the freight is beginning to improve; while John Bromley, member of Parliament and the locomotive men's leader, is sufficiently optimistic to think that trade and employment will shortly take an upward curve, "which will steepen rapidly once it starts."

Rev. Moorhead Legate's Christmas Message

At the forenoon service in St. James Church on Sunday Rev. R. Moorhead Legate, B.D., delivered the following interesting sermon: St. Luke 11, 15, "And the shepherds said, Let us now go even unto Bethlehem and see . . . and they came and found the Babe lying in a manger."

The eyes and hearts of christendom are turning at this season to a little town set amid the Syrian hills. If you and I could visit Bethlehem today we would see strange sights. Loving reverence has made the reputed stable of the inn a shrine. Over that sacred spot where Christ's cradle stood is built the oldest church in the world. It is floored and decorated with the choicest marbles. Sweet smelling incense loads the air around the altar. The place is radiant with many lamps, each (it is said) the gift of a king. The light falls softly upon the great silver star let into the floor which marks the spot where the Virgin brought forth her first-born Son. And the solemn, joyous chant of a hundred voices rises and falls as the worshippers bow low: "His name for ever shall endure, last like the sun it shall, men shall be blest in Him, and blest, all nations shall Him call."

On the long grassy slopes that stretch beyond the terraced vineyards around Bethlehem, the sheep are pastured. And, on that holy night, the shepherds guarded their flocks from the wolves and jackals. When the glory of the Lord broke the darkness, and the sweet cadence of the heavenly song fell upon their ears, "Glory to God in the highest, on earth peace, goodwill to all men." And is not one of sweetest thoughts associated with the Christmas message, this? That it was to shepherds, simple-minded, honest, hardworking men that the first announcement of the Saviour's birth was made. Not to the proud and bigoted pharisee, not to the coldly intellectual Sadducee, not to the rich or the high-born, or the learned, but to humble men doing their duty at humble work. It teaches us so beautifully the great eternal truths that it is to the humble heart that God shows Himself most clearly, fully and tenderly. It rebukes the arrogant spirit of the times which holds that God cannot be seen and served in lowly ways, but that we must have noise and advertisement in religion as in everything else. Let us lay this treasure of a thought to our hearts, and the shepherds followed the song as the wise men followed the star, "Let us go to Bethlehem," they said, and see this thing that is come to pass.

"And they came and found the Babe in His Cradle." It is a great day, in the life of any man or woman when they can say "I have found the Christ." Nigh two thousand years have raced away since the shepherds found the Saviour in his cradle, and He is still waiting to be found by men and women. Another happy Christmas season brings you and me close to His cradle, and it needs no great forcing of our imagination to fix our eyes on the Holy child. But to see the Christ may be far short of finding the Christ. We have all seen the Christ, we have seen in the history of mankind. We know how true it is that He was born a man, that He taught and worked and lived and died for men. We see the impress of His influence down all the ages, and more today than ever in human systems and human institutions. We have seen Christ in literature, we have read His words and are familiar with His thoughts and teachings, there is scarcely a newspaper or a book to-day that does not reflect His spirit directly, or indirectly. But if we have drawn the line at seeing the Christ in such ways as that, we have not found Him as He wants to be found. If we have not found Him as a living, breathing, real friend, a helper in every true purpose, a staunch comrade in every difficult endeavor, a savior who can save to the uttermost everyone who puts his trust in Him. We may have "seen" Him but we have not yet "found" Him. Some of us will have to go a good deal further than we have yet gone before we can really say "I have found the Christ." Mind you, I believe there is more sincere seeking for the Christ today than ever there has been, although much of it is being done not in what we church people would call an orthodox way. But I do think that deep down at the bottom of the shaking-up process that is taking place all over the world today the central desire is, "Let us go to Bethlehem and see this thing that is come to pass." I do believe that the world is coming to the realization of what has been an indefinite longing, that it cannot do without the Christ, and that it must, at all costs, find the Christ. We all need to find the Christ more fully than we have done. We in the church need to find Him more truly and more fully. We must not deceive ourselves into imagining that

because we have endorsed certain doctrinal statements, or just because we are highly moral and respectable. To find the Christ fully is to have the heart and life dominated by Him, to have Him sitting upon the throne of the heart supreme and undisputed. His spirit controlling all our thoughts and words and works. The final test of our knowledge of Jesus Christ is what effect that knowledge has upon our character. A creed must be judged by the kind of life which it produces. If our knowledge of Jesus Christ lifts our life from a low level to a higher, if it makes us purer, more patient, more kindly, more noble, if it sets our faces toward the stars, then that knowledge of Christ is evidence that we have really found Him as He desires to be found. And it is only when He is thus found that the home will be made again the sacred place it was meant to be, and the root of all our troubles, selfishness, will die in the soil of a better life, and war and want, and sin and sorrow will give right of way to the love that conquers all, the love that came to light in the cradle of Bethlehem. These gracious changes for the world's happiness and peace will all come about, when your heart and mine and the hearts of all of us are offered as warm cradles for the Holy Child Jesus. For it is the heart of you and me that must find the Christ Child. As we stand under the spell of Bethlehem today do not the echoes of Tennyson's bells fall upon our ears:—

Ring out the old, ring in the new; Ring, happy bells, across the snow. The year is going, let him go! Ring out the false, ring in the true!

Ring out the want, the care, the sin, the faithless coldness of the times— Ring in the love of truth and right; Ring in the common love of good!

Ring out old shapes of foul disease, Ring out the narrowing lust of gold; Ring out the thousand wars of old; Ring in the thousand years of peace!

Ring in the valiant man, and free, The larger heart, the kinder hand; Ring out the darkness of the land, Ring in the Christ that is to be!

Unto the Father, and unto the Son, and unto the Holy Ghost, be ascribed to the church all honor and glory, might, majesty, dominion and blessing, now, henceforth and forever, amen.
