THE North Sydney Herald says:—
The entries for the races to take place
at the North Sydney Driving Park on
Wednesday, July 12th, are now closed
and each class is well filled with horses
from all parts of the province. These
races will no doubt be the most inter-
esting ever held in Eastern Nova Scotia.
In addition to the classes already adver-
tised a special purse of \$300 is offered
for free-for-all horses, and in this con-
test some of the fastest horses in the
lower provinces will compete, notably,
Minto record 2.19, owned by J. R.
Lamy, Esq., Amherst, and Montrose,
2.20, owned by Messrs. Redden Bros.
Charlottetown, P. E. I. These horses
took first and second prizes in the free-
forall at Springhill on Saturday last.
In the 2.25, 2.35 and 3.00 classes a
number of well-known horses are en-
tered and the public may expect to see
very speedy and keenly contested races
in each class. Beau Prince, Reddin
Bros, Charlottetown will also take part
in the races. R. Steel and other well-
known drivers will handle horses in the
race.

REV. R. MACLEAN, of Valleyfield, was
called upon to officiate at funeral ser-
vices on three consecutive days this
week, viz: Monday, Tuesday, and Wed-
nesday. On Monday the remains of the
late Miss Maggie MacPhee of Heber-
dale, were laid to rest in the quiet cem-
tery at Valleyfield. Miss MacPhee had
been ill for some seven months before
the end came. She was in the 53rd
year of her age and bore her illness
with Christian fortitude.—On Tuesday
the remains of the late Mrs. Alexander
Martin, of Grand View, were interred
at Orwell. She was in the 85th year
of her age, and during the past nine
years was unable to move owing to
rheumatic fever. Though sorely tried,
she murmured not, but quietly
submitted to the Divine Will,
knowing that the final sum-
mons had good things in store for
her. Mr. Martin, M. P., of
Grand View, is a son of the deceased.
On Wednesday the remains of Mr. Thomas
Hume, of Brooklyn, Lot 61, were con-
fined to their last resting place in Com-
pton's Cemetery, Brooklyn. Deceased
was the young man who was so hor-
ribly injured in MacDonald's Mills, Mon-
tague, his leg having been torn off by
some machinery. The funeral service
by Rev. R. MacLean was the most im-
pressive ever listened to in this sec-
tion. Women sobbed and cried, and
men, strong and sturdy as oaks, gave
vent to their feelings in tears. It was an
occasion that will not soon be forgotten
by the large crowds that had
assembled to pay their last tribute of
respect to the remains of one who, by
his generous, kindly and friendly dis-
position, had won the love and esteem
of all who had the pleasure of his ac-
quaintance. Physically he was strong
and very active, and he was a general
favorite in social circles. He was in
the 21st year of his age; and his early
demise is rendered doubly sad from the
fact that his time of service in the Mo-
ntague mills had been up the day pre-
vious to his death. It was his intention
to go to the States in a few weeks; but
he consented to stay at the mills for a
few days after his time was up, and on
the first day the fatal mishap occurred.

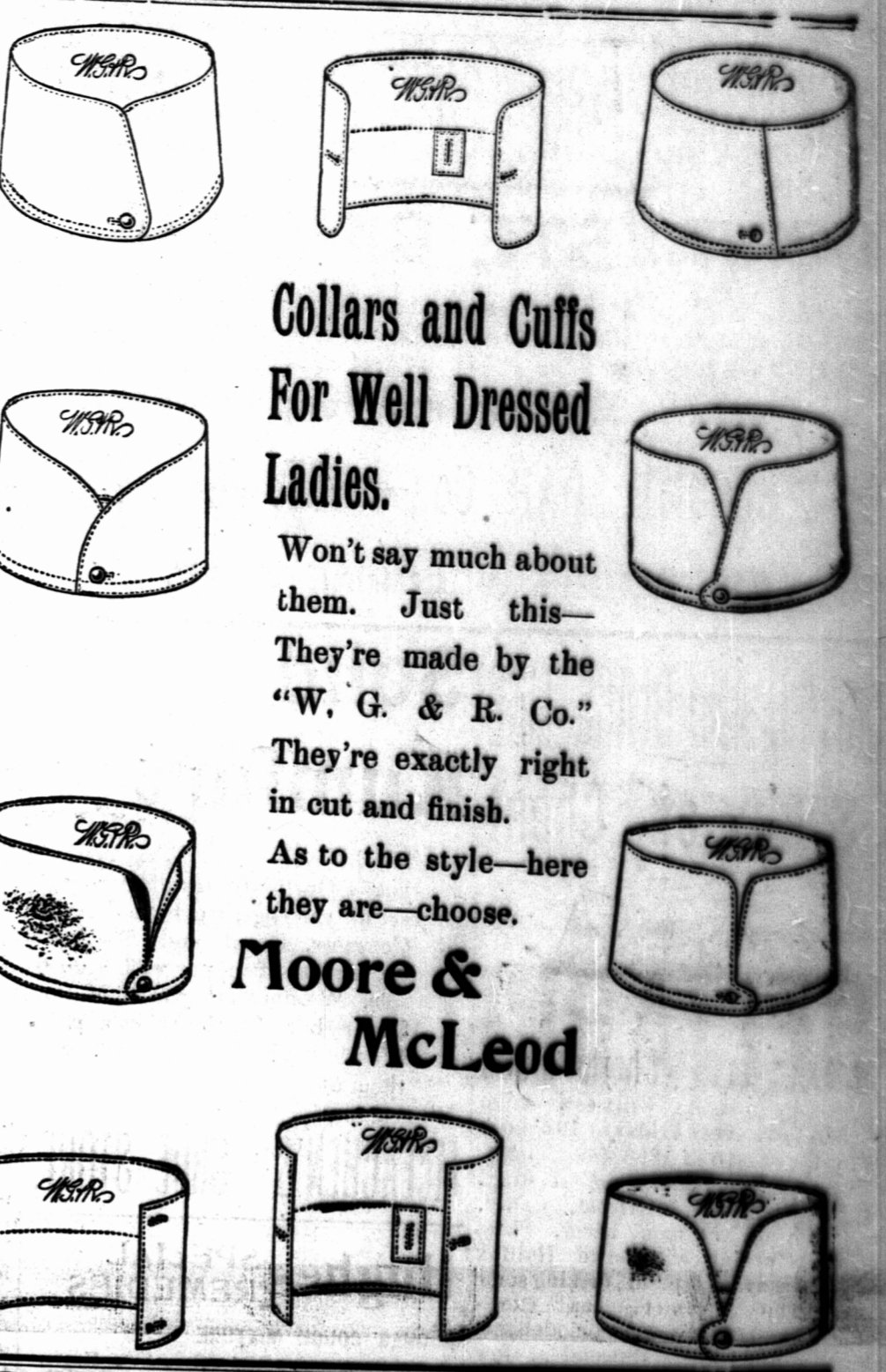
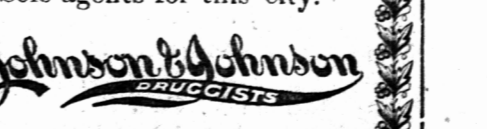
