Stocks Dip Downward In Short Session

NEW YORK, Dec. 29—In a typical year-end market stocks sold moderately lower on balance Saturday.

A fair scattering of issues moved up a bit against the trend, but realizing and light tax sales, in the final session in which regular delivery can be made before the close of 1935, were the dominant influences.

A few losses ran from 2 to 4 points but in most cases declines were limited to fractions to a point or so, and the few gains were generally confined to a similar range.

The Associated Press average of 99 stocks fell 4 1/2 points at \$4.24, with the principal dip appearing in the 30 industrials, off 6 1/2 points.

Japan Charges Missionaries With Inciting Students

SHANGHAI, Dec. 27—Yielding to importunities of a worried government, Chinese students called off today their daring "advance on Nanking" in a railway train they had seized.

TOKYO, Dec. 27—(A.P.)—Japan through reports from consular agents, charged today that British and United States missionaries were leading student agitation in China against Japan.

A government spokesman while disclosing that these accusations were made in the reports, declined to state what action, if any, the government would take in the matter.

Missionary participation was noteworthy, he commented, because in previous student agitation and demonstrations mission schools had remained aloof.

The schools involved were not named by the spokesman. Japanese press dispatches from China said, however, that an American official of Yenching University at Peiping, centre of the North China autonomy movement, was a leading instigator of student strikes and other manifestations against Japanese control.

The name of this person was not contained in the dispatches. Dispatches from China during the current agitation named United States-educated Chinese teachers in the various universities as among the leaders against the North China autonomy movement.

These educationists, however, insisted that the demonstrations were spontaneous.
