The first case before chief justice Sullivan and a jury at Georgetown called on Wednesday was George Gunn and S. Winslow Clark, Mt. Stewart. The action was of considerable interest and claimed much attention. It was an action arraigned by the father of a girl for damages against the defendant on account of the seduction of his daughter, the plaintiff claiming that by reason of the seduction he had sustained damages. A large number of witnesses were examined and the jury yesterday afternoon returned the verdict for plaintiff for \$100. Mr. Gaudet of Hazzard and Gaudet and Mr. Johnson, K. C. for plaintiff and Mr. Johnson, K. C. for defendant. The court is now engaged hearing an ejectment suit of McEachern vs. McDonald.
