SUSPECTS ARRESTED IN HUNGARY

Are Held In Connection With Purported Conspiracy To Overthrow Gov't.

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Nov. 29. (A.P.)—One hundred and twenty suspects arrested in connection with a purported conspiracy to overthrow the government and establish a dictatorship were huddled in the Budapest military prison tonight. It was widely believed they were awaiting arraignment before a military court, but this depends on the decision of the public prosecutor. If their activities are found to have been directed at the state itself rather than against the public, only such a course surely will be followed.

Dissatisfied With Conference Mahatma Returns To Take Up "Weaponless Battle Against England".

LONDON, Nov. 29.—(A.P.)—From behind a curtain of cold, raw fog the Mahatma M. K. Gandhi before dawn today revealed as he walked the streets his plans to renew the struggle in behalf of India. "There is going to be hell," he said. "The little man, with his head bowed, his shoulders drooping and his homespun shawl pulled tightly around his scrawny body, said: 'I leave Saturday for Bombay. There I shall take up again our weaponless battle against England.'"

His voice sounded almost spectral as it came waveringly through the thick fog to the listener at his side. He remarked mournfully: "I came here expecting nothing and I

C. P. R. Earnings

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 29.—The Canadian Pacific Railway Company reports gross earnings of \$13,501,048 for the month of October, this being a reduction of \$3,772,132 from October of 1930. In the month expenses were cut from \$10,658,974 to \$8,948,623, a drop of \$1,810,351, leaving net earnings for the month of \$4,552,424, a reduction of \$1,961,782 from October of last year, when net totalled \$6,514,206.

Gross for the ten months was \$119,415,656 against \$152,254,502, or a reduction of \$33,838,846. Expenses were reduced by \$23,653,307 in the same period to \$100,102,990, leaving the net earnings for the ten months \$18,312,866, against \$29,498,205, or a reduction of \$10,185,339.

Thrilling Tale Of Ocean's Fury

Captain And Crew Of Six Of Small Schooner Fought 54-Day Battle With Death, And Won.

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 29.—A tale of the ocean's fury, of a 54-day battle with death, hunger, thirst, and—at last—rescue, has come up from Central American waters. It was a story of men who used their clothing for the flare which brought rescue—the same clothing which for days had been hung on the deck of their ship to catch rain water that they might fight off thirst. Up from Tela, Honduras, to the United Fruit Company here came the story of the rescue by the United Fruit European steamship Aztec in the tropical seas on November 16 of the Captain and crew of six—all Newfoundlanders—of the three masted schooner Ria. The story was twelve days late in coming, but lost none of its drama in the delay. Captain E. H. Brice of the Aztec, a British naval reserve officer for thirteen years and a naval officer for three years during the Great War, left Avonmouth on November

N. S. Premier Belgian Glass To Take Rest

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 29.—Premier Gordon S. Harrington will leave the hospital here within the next few days "to take a complete rest," his physicians said tonight. An operation has been decided against for the present. The Premier has been under observation at the hospital since last Wednesday night, entering the Victoria General immediately after addressing the Maritime Board of Trade and issuing an appeal on behalf of the National Service Loan. At that time it was said an operation for appendicitis might be necessary.

100 STOLEN CARS SOLD IN MARITIMES

Autos Seized In Parrsboro Reveals "Ring" Operating In United States.

PARRSBORO, N. S., Nov. 29.—(By the Canadian Press)—Five motor cars, said to be part of a flotilla stolen in the United States and Montreal and sold in the Maritime Provinces, were seized at Parrsboro Shore yesterday by insurance company agents and Nova Scotia police. The present ostensible owners, all prominent residents of the district, had made the purchases in good faith, authorities said. Serial and engine numbers had been obliterated.

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Soviet Spies Are Executed

BARONOWICZE, Poland, Nov. 29.—(A.P.)—Seven men found guilty yesterday of acting as Soviet spies were executed immediately after the trial, it was learned yesterday. The President of the Republic declined to pardon the condemned men. The spies were convicted of selling to Russia plans of a railway station at the Polish-Russian frontier. Evidence was heard that they offered their services to the Polish Intelligence Department and then provided the department with material manufactured by the Soviet military authorities. Details of the trial, which was conducted with great speed, were suppressed by the Government under the terms of a recent degree authorizing accelerated courts.

Three Children Burn To Death

FORT RIVER, Man., Nov. 29.—(By the Canadian Press)—Three children of William Berkis, playing upstairs when fire broke out in their two-story frame home here, were burned to death shortly before noon today. Berkis, his wife and four other children escaped from a downstairs room, but were unable to reach the trio of youngsters trapped above.

CRASHED

RIVER JOHN, N. S., Nov. 29.—(By the Canadian Press)—Charles Crawford, Truro pilot, suffered a partial fracture of the skull here yesterday afternoon when the "Heath Parasol" home-constructed plane he was flying crashed from a height of twenty five feet. He had previously taken the air flier up for a successful twelve minute flight, making a perfect landing, and was gliding down, his motor cut, after a second trip, when the little plane flattened out, struck, and nosed over. Crawford was rushed to Pictou Hospital. The plane was owned by D. McKay Ross of River John, who had built it from plans. The machine was badly smashed.

Oversubscription Of Nat. Service Loan Is Assured

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 29.—(By the Canadian Press)—Canada has declared a vote of confidence in itself. Oversubscription of the National Service Loan, a huge issue of \$150,000,000 or approximately \$15 for every person in the Dominion is assured and the books will be closed at the end of business tomorrow, according to an official statement by the acting Minister of Finance, Hon. Edgar N. Rhodes. Books were opened on Monday last and immediately came an overwhelming response from all sections of the country, from Canadians in other countries, and from United States and British firms doing business in Canada. 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YOUTH TAKES OWN LIFE

BRIDGEWATER, N. S., Nov. 29.—(By the Canadian Press)—William J. Gaynor, twenty three year old youth of Middletown, attended a "wild west" show at Bridgetown last night with two companions, pulled a light rifle from beneath the motorcar seat as they prepared to return home, said "goodbye, boys," and fired a bullet into his own body. He died this morning in Bridgewater Hospital having regained consciousness only momentarily. Authorities are endeavoring to determine whether the Middleton youth believed the gun to be unloaded, and was acting in fun, or whether the fatally self inflicted wound was deliberate.

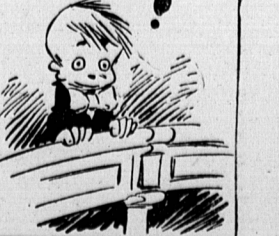
