

Voluntary Censorship To Continue

LONDON, July 21.—(CP)—The government has decided to continue the present system of voluntary censorship of home news after a consideration of stricter alternatives, an official announcement said today.

Under this system newspapers generally submit to censors only material about which they are doubtful. But they are obliged to submit all material on certain subjects.
