RUSSIA IN MUTUAL PACT WITH ESTONIA

Reds Given Permission To Establish Naval Bases And Airdromes.

MOSCOW, Sept. 29 (Friday) — (AP)—Soviet Russia today announced conclusion of a mutual assistance and trade agreement with her Baltic neighbor, Estonia. Tass, official Soviet news agency, said the pact was signed Thursday, after four days of negotiations beginning Sunday.

The pact, Estonia gave the Soviet the right to maintain naval bases and several airdromes, leased "at a reasonable price" on the Estonian Islands of Saaremaa (Oesel) and Hiiuma (Dagoe) and in the port of Paldiski (Baltiskil). The new bases gave the Soviet domination of a strategic position at the entrance to the Gulf of Riga and the Gulf of Finland.

The pact bound each country to render every assistance, "including military," in the event of aggression or menace of aggression arising on the part of any European power against the land frontiers of Latvia, or against the sea frontiers of either in the Baltic Sea. The naval guarantee included the new bases acquired by the Soviet under the pact with Estonia.

The Soviet also agreed to render assistance in providing the Estonian army with armaments and equipment. The pact provided that the exact sites of the new Soviet bases and the forces to be maintained there would be defined and exactly limited by future agreement.

The pact was made for a term of 10 years with a possible continuation for five years more if not denounced by either party one year before expiration of its original term. A reservation said "this pact should not affect in any extent the sovereignty rights of the contracting parties, in particular their economic systems and state organization."

Oven Cooked Fillets of Fish

(Cod, Haddock, Whitefish, Sole, etc., may be used)
The fish may be cut into pieces of a suitable size for serving or the fillets may be left whole. Dip each piece into salted milk (one-half tablespoonful of salt to one-half cupful of whole milk or diluted evaporated milk), toss into a pan of sifted dry bread crumbs, coat thoroughly and place in a well oiled baking pan. Sprinkle with oil and place in a very hot oven (500° F.). Bake until fish is tender and crumbs nicely browned (about 10 minutes). Serve with Tartar Sauce. Tomato aspic jelly and lemon completes the dish.
