MRS. EDGAR VILLET

Clipped from a paper published at Bishop, Calif.—When the visitation of death takes away the young wife and mother, leaving little orphans, it is touching the sympathies more deeply than under any other circumstances. Strangers as well as friends are moved by it as by nothing else. Such is the case of Mrs. Edgar Villet, who died at the home of her friend, Mrs. C. M. Dixon, shortly before noon Tuesday, January 4th. Her sadly bereft husband is left with the care of two babes, one about fifty months, the other but a few weeks' old. Though the family are strangers to many of our readers, there are many who in this dark hour will most deeply feel with him. Mrs. Villet was a cousin of W. H. Collett, of Bishop. Mrs. Villet and her husband came here from Prince Edward Island in April, 1899. During the employment of her husband at Mammoth and elsewhere as occasion required, she has made her home with Mrs. C. M. Dixon, who has been to her more than a friend. In the final illness she has had this devoted care, as well as the most assiduous attention of physician, husband and others, but it seems that nothing was humanly possible to stay the hand of death. Tomorrow, at the Odd Fellows' Cemetery, will be laid to rest the mortal part of this lady, taken away at so untimely an age—but twenty-five years. The pall-bearers were all Prince Edward Island boys, viz. Wm. Smith, Isaac Smith, John McIntosh, Roy McIntosh, John Bulbit and Fred Bulbit. The late Mrs. Villet was an adopted daughter of Neil Snow, DeSables, who was her uncle. (Patriot please copy.)

TO RATIFY TREATIES BY PARLIAMENT

OTTAWA, January 26.—The Senate (North Simcoe) will offer a resolution when the house is moved into treaty territory, regarding navigation, arbitration, fisheries, controversy, and boundaries, revision of territory and private rights, should be made subject to ratification by parliament. Mr. Lator (Hedmark) has given notice of a resolution on the same subject, and the government will have to take a definite plan by which the adoption and construction of public buildings will be determined as funds become available for the construction of same. Mr. Thompson (Manitoba) will enquire of the minister on Friday what is being done by the government to prevent the assets of the defunct Farmers' bank from being sold off or taken up in useless and unnecessary legal expenses, and what steps are being taken by the government to ascertain the value of the Kestev mine property, and to preserve the same as an asset of this said bank.
