DEBBS NOTIFIED BY PHONE HE MUST GO TO PRISON

CLEVELAND, OHIO, April 14.—The United States Supreme Court man date, ordering that Eugene V. Debbs, Socialist leader, be taken to Moundsville (W. Va.) federal prison to begin a ten years sentence for violation of the espionage act by making utterances against the government in a speech at Canton, Ohio, was received by District Attorney Werts today. Werts immediately got into communication with Debbs by telephone at Terre Haute (Ind.), notifying him to deliver himself here, which Debbs promised to do, saying that he was ready to go to prison and would make no further effort to delay carrying out his sentence. Debbs was found guilty by a federal court jury here on Sept. 21 last and has been out on bail since.

THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

PARIS, April 14.—The following is the official summary of the covenant of the League of Nations as issued.

"1.—The League of Nations is founded in order to promote international co-operation and to secure peace. The league will include: (A) The belligerent states named in a document annexed to the covenant; (B) All the neutral states so named, and (C) In the future any self-governing country whose admission is approved by two-thirds of the states already members of the league. A state may withdraw from the league, providing it has kept its obligations to date, on giving two years notice.

"2.—The league will act through an assembly comprising not more than three representatives of each of the member states, each state having only one vote, and a council comprising for the present one representative of each of the five great powers and each of four other powers as selected from time to time by the assembly.

"The number of powers of each class represented on the council may be increased by the unanimous consent of the council and a majority of the assembly. Other powers have the right to sit as members of the council during the discussion of matters in which they are especially interested.

"In the council, as in the assembly each state will have only one vote. Both these bodies are to meet at stated intervals, (the council at least once a year and at other times if required) both can deal with any matter that is of international interest or that threatens the peace of the world; the decision of both must be unanimous except in certain specified cases, matters of procedure, for instance, being decided by a majority vote.

"The league will have a permanent secretariat, under a secretary general. The secretariat and all other bodies under the league may include women equally with men. A permanent court of international justice and various permanent commissions and bureaus are also to be established.

"3.—The member states agree: (A) To reduce their armaments, plans for such reduction being suggested by the council, but only adopted with the consent of the states themselves, and thereafter not to increase them without the concurrence of the council; (B) To exchange full information of their existing armies and their naval and military programmes; (C) To respect each other's territory and personal independence and to guarantee them against foreign aggression; (D) To submit all international disputes either to arbitration or to inquiry by the council, which latter, however, may not pronounce an opinion on any dispute whose subject matter falls solely within a state's domestic jurisdiction, in no case to go to war till three months after an award, or any unanimous recommendation has been made, and even then not to go to war with a state which accepts the award or recommendation; (E) To regard a state which has broken the covenant as having committed an act of war against the league, to break off all economic and other relations with it and to allow free passage through their territories to the troops of those states which are contributing armed force on behalf of the league.

Council to Recommend Force

"The council is to recommend what amount of force, if any, should be supplied by the several governments concerned, but the approval of the latter is necessary. (States not mem-

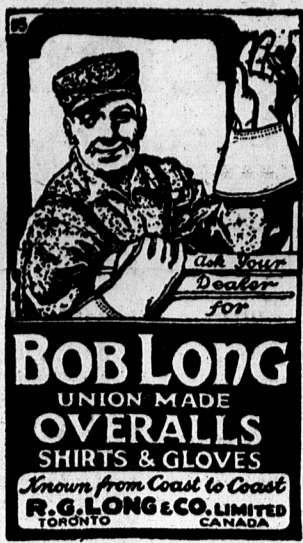
SHORT COURSES IN FOREIGN TRADE.

The absence of preparatory work in Canadian schools and colleges for the study of foreign trade service has been brought prominently before the Canadian Trade Commission in its investigations into possibilities for increased Dominion export trade. It is felt that a permanent expansion of our trade abroad must be undertaken if manufacturers are adequately to share in meeting the burden which the great additions to the national debt will impose for many years to come. Extension of home markets will not meet the needs in the same way.

As a first step to bringing before the public the importance of means for the training of younger men to take up foreign trade work, the Trade Commission has written to all the Canadian universities asking if they can give their immediate support by establishing, this summer, short courses for business men and students featuring especially aspects of foreign trade.

It is believed this matter will be enthusiastically taken up by younger men and women anxious to secure an opening in life which will apparently not be overcrowded and which will develop in importance as trade of the Dominion increases. There appears to be a decided quickening of opinion in Canada as in Great Britain and all the British overseas dominions in the study of modern languages for the securing not merely of the trade which formerly fell to German and Austrian merchants, but in the wider fields of China, the East Indies and South America.

The one thing which the Commission insists upon is that the present reconstructive work in Europe must be regarded as only showing the way



of the league will be invited to accept the obligations of the league for the purpose of particular dispute, and if they fail to comply may be forced. (F)—Not to consider any treaty binding till it has been communicated to the league, which will then proceed to publish it, to admit the right of the assembly to advise reconsideration of treaties and international conditions which do not accord with present needs, and to be bound by no obligations inconsistent with the covenant.

"A state which breaks its agreements may be expelled from the league by the council.

"4.—The covenant does not affect the validity of international engagements, such as treaties of arbitration or regional understandings like the Monroe doctrine, for securing the maintenance of peace.

"5.—The German colonies and the territories of the Ottoman empire are to be administered in the interests of civilization by states which are willing to be mandatories of the league, which will exercise a general supervision.

"6.—The member states accept certain responsibilities with regard to labor conditions, the treatment of natives, the white slave traffic, the opium traffic, the arms traffic and uncivilized and semi-civilized countries industrial and trade conditions, public health and Red Cross societies.

"7.—The league is recognized as the central body interested in co-ordinating and assisting international activities generally.

"8.—Amendments to the covenant require the approval of all the states on the council and a simple majority of those in the assembly. States which signify their dissent from amendments thus approved are not bound by them, but, in this case, cease to be member of the league."

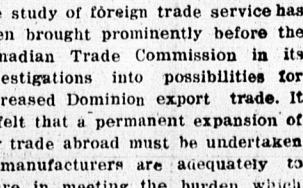
Crimean Capital Taken

ADVERSE CONDITIONS POSTPONE FLIGHT

Special Cable to The Chronicle. ST. JOHN'S Nfld., April 13.—Today for the second time the Sopwith airman abandoned their attempt to start the transatlantic flight, adverse weather conditions preventing their departure. Heavy winds from the southeast, with dense fog, thick rain and general murkiness prevailed. The ground was steeped with water after raining for a whole night, and these conditions continued all day.

The airman and officials visited the air field during the forenoon and had arranged for horses to move their machine from the hangar to the ground outside, but at one o'clock, being then unable to see the signal station on the hill at the entrance of the harbor, which they proposed to use as a guiding landmark on departure, they decided to postpone the attempt till tomorrow.

During the afternoon they visited the Martinside airman at their canvas hangar at Qui Dividi, due north-east of the town, and inspected the machine there, returning the call which the Martinside men made on the previous afternoon. The parties compared the points of resemblance and difference in both machines and exchanged views as to the efficiency of the various items of equipment.

The Martinside machine, which is somewhat smaller than the Sopwith, is well on towards assembling, although only landed from the steamer yesterday. Indeed it would have been practically complete, but that two cases out of the whole shipment were separated from the others, packed with cargo for Halifax, on the steamer Sachem, and only found after great trouble this morning.

The machine will probably be ready tomorrow or Tuesday and a start is likely to be made on Wednesday, a day or two, if Hawker starts meanwhile, so that news of his experience may reach here before Raynham begins his flight.

Spectators think that the chances of the Martinside men escaping are very slight, owing to the smallness of the machine, the lack of a boat or other life-saving apparatus, and the strain on the occupants during their long journey.

The Admiralty wireless station near St. John's is today arranging for closer touch with shipping on Atlantic so that during the next week wireless operators on all vessels traversing the steamship lane may be on the alert for signals from one or other of these aircraft and ready to hurry to the assistance of the occupants if a demand is made for help.

Preparations for the Handy-Page machine's start are being speedily concluded at Harbor Grace and the first flight attempt is hourly expected.

The Martinside airman have applied to the authorities for policemen for Tuesday afternoon, stating that they intend making the Atlantic flight then, and desiring to have the course kept clear.
