WOMAN CLIMBER BEATS RECORD

BANGOR, Wales, Sept. 29.—(C. P.)—New Welsh climbing records were established by a party of climbers on a woman, when they reached the summit of the 15 highest peaks in Snowdonia in well under the previous existing record. This hazardous feat, undertaken in the worst possible conditions for climbing was accomplished by T. J. Firbank, a sheep farmer of Dyffryn Mynydd, his wife, Mrs. Esme Firbank and a few others. Mrs. Firbank took nine hours 29 minutes to set up a woman's record for the climb on a 30 mile route to an altitude of more than 3000 feet.

LOWER BIRTH-RATE ENDANGERS EMPIRE

EDINBURGH, Sept. 29.—(CP)—Pointing out the danger of declining population, Sir Leonard Hill, prominent English physician and director of research, said the government should act at once and "on the lines found successful in Germany, stop the decay of the British Empire which is going on through birth control." Sir Leonard was speaking at the annual conference of the Sanitary Inspectors' Association of which he is president. Britain's birth-rate, 35 per thousand in 1870 had fallen to 15 per thousand. Sir Leonard said and in all democratic countries of Europe the birth-rate was under 15 per thousand. Germany had raised her rate to 19 while Italy's rate was 22. "The birth rate," he continued, "is on the downward grade all over the world, and it is not due to crowding because in Australia and New Zealand the birth-rate has fallen to under 15 per thousand. It has been estimated that by 1951 the number of children in England and Wales would have fallen from 8,500,000 in 1921 to 5,500,000 while people aged 45 and over would have increased by 2,500,000. This was because the British had been doing everything to secure comfort and prolong life and nothing to encourage the birth of children on which the virility of a nation depended.

Some Hardy Prunus Species of Value For Breeding

(Experimental Farms News) The best varieties of plums and cherries can be grown in Canada only in the most climatically favoured parts, states A. W. S. Hunter, Division of Horticulture, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa. They are too tender either in their wood elsewhere. There are a number of wild species, however, both here and introduced, that are extremely hardy. The fruit of most is considered of no commercial value in any but the coldest parts of the country, although selection with a few over a long period of time has produced acceptable varieties that have been widely planted. The possibilities of improvement by selection are strictly limited by the variation within the variety or species and hybridization must be resorted to for further results. All species are of potential value in this respect, and their improvement is only limited by the crosses that can be effected. The best available source of large fruit size and high quality in the plums is the so-called Japanese group descended from P. salicina, a native of China. Unfortunately, the European plums (P. domestica) cannot be used for this purpose because of their unique cytological constitution. Many of the hardy species is therefore more or less limited to combinations with these Japanese varieties. Already great strides have been made and hybrids with the common wild plum (P. americana) with the Canada plum (P. nigra) and with the sand cherry (P. besseyi) possess a measure of the good quality of their cultivated parent, coupled with a good deal of the hardness of their wild parent. In the cherries, high quality and large size is confined almost entirely to the sweet cherries (P. avium) and some of the sour (P. cerasus). Cold resistant varieties of P. cerasus are available, however, which, though very acid, may prove valuable for breeding purposes. Another potential source of cold resistance is the ground cherry (P. fruticosus) a native of Central and Eastern Europe and parts of Asia. It is known to cross readily with some of the sour cherries, but none of its hybrids have yet been fruited. The sweet cherry does not hybridize at all readily with any of the hardy species so far tried. Hybrids with the sour cherry have been produced but they were all most without exception entirely sterile. The only really hardy one with which it has been known to hybridize is the sand cherry (P. besseyi), a line which may prove very fruitful. No way has yet been found of utilizing the hardness of the native species, the pin or bird cherry (P. pennsylvanica), the choke cherry (P. virginiana), and the black cherry (P. serotina) because they will not cross with any known species possessing the size and quality they lack. There are possibilities, however, in the utilization of a closely related, large fruited, Central and South American cherry for the improvement of P. serotina.
