

URGES COLLEGE OF DOMESTIC AFFAIRS

CHICAGO, June 15.—A college of domestic relations—a step in advance of Chicago's Court of Domestic Relations—is strongly urged by George F. Howard, professor of sociology at the University of Nebraska.

"The sociologist, the economist, the household scientist, and other specialists should join forces in such an institution to give sound training in the problems of sex, parent and the household," he says. "No more harmful blunder was ever committed by theological subtlety than the setting aside of marriage as par excellence the divine institution."

Trained officers to perform the marriage in districts and revision of the matrimonial laws of the country are suggested by Professor Howard in an article published in the American Journal of Sociology just issued. Improvement of the matrimonial marriage customs in the United States, Professor Howard proposes as follows:

"Endowment of motherhood by the State; abolition of the common law marriage; twenty days' public notice before the issuing of license limiting marriage to those who are of age."

Of the endowment of motherhood Professor Howard says: "Recognizing parentage as a social service, social duty which should be paid for at the public expense, looks very much like social justice. In its administrative division our matrimonial laws require drastic revision at almost every point. We need a better uniform license system so as to secure full publicity and a faithful compliance with the spirit of the law."

"It is time that in school and college the family and its related institutions should be as freely and openly and unparaphrasingly subjected to scientific investigation as are the problems of political and industrial life."

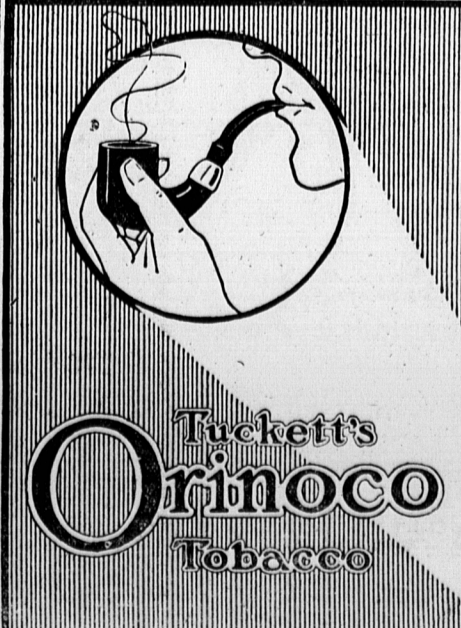

WIRELESS STATIONS OVER THE EMPIRE.

LONDON, June 17.—The Imperial Conference, yesterday afternoon discussed the motion by Sir Joseph Ward for the establishment of a chain of state owned wireless telegraph stations without the Empire. The conference agreed to the proposal of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, supported by Sir Edward Grey to negotiate with foreign governments with view to securing to the over seas Dominions the right to withdraw from any commercial treaty without impairing such treaty with respect to the remainder of the Empire. It also agreed to Sir Wilfrid's proposal to appoint Royal commission to visit the overseas Dominions and report on the trade and resources and best method for their develop-
