THE GALLANT GRAYS

By W. H. GOCHER.
Dr. Strong stands second in the list of gray trotters. He has a mark of 2.05%. Greyworthy, 2.06, is third. Cox marked him at the recent Lexington meeting and expects to make a stake horse of him next year. Greyworthy comes from a developed line of gray mares. He was got by Axworthy, out of Bowbell McKinney, 2.18%, a daughter of Boquila, 2.17%, whose dam, Tosa, 2.19%, was out of Susie G. by the gray horse Scipio. It will be interesting to watch the career of this horse and see if he can break down the barrier which has stood between gray trotters and victory since Doble made such a splendid showing with Jack in 1889. That was a gray horse year, as in addition to Pilot Medium leading the money winners, Hendrix won the first M. & M. at Detroit and Alcyron landed the Charter Oak Purse at Hartford. In the thirty one years which have elapsed since that date the high spots reached by gray trotters were made by Bob Douglass, Dr. Strong, Senator A. 2.19, when he wore down the field in the Transylvania in 1896, and John Taylor, 2.08%, when he defeated Wainwright in the \$10,000 event at Detroit in 1903.

Of the other gray trotters, Jack Curry won several races with Super, 2.10, before he was shipped to Russia, while Dandy Jim, 2.09%, and Jim Ferry, 2.09%, were as fast a pair of sprinters as ever took the word in any company. Albert C. 2.09%, did not do much racing. Vanity Oro, 2.09%, was retired after she made her record, while Dr. Mack, 2.09%, and Amo, 2.09%, did the most of their racing on the half-mile tracks.

At the beginning of 1920, there were fifty-three gray pacers in the 2.10 list. Earl Jr., and Fay Richmond are the fastest. Each of them carry records of 2.01%. Earl Jr. inherited his color from his dam Jenny Cameron, while Fay Richmond got his from his sire New Richmond, 2.07%. This line runs from them through Jewess to the gray horse A. W. Richmond, which Joseph Cairn Simpson took to California. A. W. Richmond also sired the mares which produced Silver Dick, 2.09%, and Waldo J., 2.09, another pair of grays.

Of the other gray sires which are represented in the 2.10 list of pacers, Manager, with a record of 2.02T, leads with Bob Manager, 2.08%, and The Ghost, 2.08%. He was got by Nutwood, out of the gray mare Carrie, 2.29%, a daughter of George Wilkes and the gray mare Belle Bashaw, which also produced Strong Boy, 2.12, the sire of Dr. Strong, 2.05%. Alcyron, the blind horse, is represented by Amos R., 2.09%, while his son Alcyron, another gray, is credited with Sylviane, 2.09%. The Eel, 2.02%, appears in the 2.10 list as the sire of Eel Direct, 2.09%, and Re-Election, as has been stated, is the sire of Refine, 2.08%, the gray mare which Jock Bowen raced in New England for several years.

Blue Bull had two gray sons that sired 2.10 speed at the pace. Of this pair, Jim Wilson got Wiltraber, 2.06%, the sire of the gray gelding Arrow Tranby that made a time record of 2.05 at Indianapolis last month. The other, Blueskin was a brother to the gray mare Kate McCall, 2.23, which John D. Bonshaw, Rev. F. J. Neil and wife, Collingwood, N. S.; J. J. McGilvray, Collingwood, N. S.; J. H. Hough, Newington; M. Ken-

The gray horse Democracy, 2.07%, which carried everything before him on the half-mile tracks a few years ago was got by Happy Partner, a gray son of Happy Medium, Verwood, a son of Wilkeswood, passed his color along to Joellaco, 2.08%, while the gray coat of Birdie B., 3.09%, ran through Nicholas S., to the gray mare Lady Brooks by Amber, one of the first American trotters taken to Australia. All of the other 2.10 gray pacers

inherited the color from their dams Walter Hal, 2.04, was out of Duck by Brown Hal and the gray Mary Bales, 2.26%, in addition to producing the beautiful trotter Wilkes Brewer, also threw the almost white pacer Zombrewer, 2.04%. The gray horse Wood Patch, 2.05%, now in Murphy's stable, got his color from Phonol, 2.07%, through her daughter Heloise Grattan. Doctor B. P. 2.05%, is out of Fossie O., 2.15%, while Arab Girl produced Bessie Bonehill, 2.05%, the dam of Joe Patchen 2nd, 2.03%.

Of the other gray pacers, Guy, 2.06%, Ella T., 2.08%, and Gill Curry, 2.09%, were rated as the most successful in races. Prior to their day, when the high wheel sulkies were in vogue, Argyle, 2.14%, was an important factor in a number of events. Sammy Keyes of Pittsburgh also made a place for Lucy, 2.14 in the big four. Her breeding was unknown, some one having shipped her east in a car of horses before her speed was discovered. The pacers also had a gray champion in Sweeter. He cut the world's record at that gait to 2.16 in 1877 and equalled it the following year after Sleepy George reduced it to 2.15 in a race.

The Gladys Klark Company of Prince Edward Theatre last night when they presented before an exceptionally large audience "The Blindness of Virtue" a recent play from the pen of Cosmo Hamilton an English writer.
