—The first meeting of the new Summerside Town Council took place Monday the Mayor and all the councillors being present. Bills to the amount of \$821.55 were read and with the exception of a couple of them, they were passed and ordered to be paid. A petition was read from the residents of East St. asking for a light and was referred to fire and light committee. A letter from W. P. Doull, Charlottetown, re defective wiring of Market hall was read and referred to same committee.

Intimation of the expiring of the lease of Market hall to W. J. Whitney was given by the Town Clerk, and it was moved by Coun. McNeill, seconded by Coun. A draft memorial to the Provincial Government asking that the building lately used as a jail be given to the town for use as a contagious hospital. Some discussion took place with reference to repairs to the town wharf and freight shed, after which the council adjourned until Monday next the 15th inst.

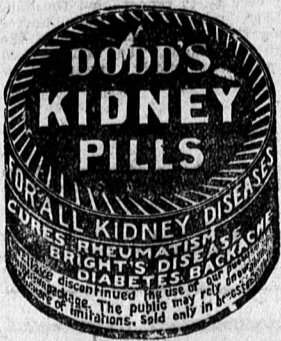
