He spoke from the 15th chapter of St. Matthew and alluded to the kindly relations that had existed between him and his congregation. He thanked them for their words of encouragement and ready Christian sympathy in public and private. A successor to Rev. Mr. Stevenson has not yet been named. St. John Telegraph.

LENNOX ISLAND NOTES.—The oyster fishing here is about over, and boats are hauled up for the winter. A very good business in oysters was done this season and prices good—Michael Thomas paying as much as \$7.00 per bbl. A large barge was built by James B. Bernard and Thos. Abram and used to carry the oysters between here and Mill River. A number of fox have been captured by Thomas Mitchell and Peter P. Leboe, J. S. Opage caught several mink by trap. Snell season will soon be here and some of the Indians will fish and ship their catchings to the New York market.—A successful concert and social was held here a short time ago, the amount realized going towards the Parochial House fund.

THE St. John Sun says of Rev. Mr. Dickie who preached with much acceptance in Zion Church several Sundays ago: The Rev. L. G. Macneil of St. Andrew's Church has secured an assistant in his work in the person of the Rev. Gordon Dickie, M. A. Mr. Dickie is the son of the Rev. A. B. Dickie, a much esteemed minister of the Halifax Presbytery. He is a graduate of Dalhousie University and the Presbyterian College, since which he has engaged in post graduate studies in the United States and Europe. He received his M. A. degree in Harvard, and since spent a few years in theological study at the University of Marburg, Germany. Mr. Dickie has the reputation of being a fine scholar and a good preacher. He will occupy St. Andrew's pulpit at both services on Sunday.

THE Presbyterian Witness has the following review of a recent edition by Rev. A. McLean Sinclair of "Eloids": Belfast: Possibly not one of the excellent young pastors who adorn our pulpits and rejoice in the family name Mackinnon will recognize that name in "Mac' Phionghain." Well: we have the authority of one of the foremost Gaelic scholars for the statement that such is the case. One of the clan has written Gaelic poetry, and we have it under our hand. The poetry was regarded as of such value that it has been circulated in manuscript, and preserved from generation to generation and printed in 1818. It is now printed from the manuscript of John Maclean (the "Bard.") The Bard Mackinnon was born in 1770. In 1794 he joined the army and fought in the "Low Country" and afterwards in Egypt. He has written admirable battle songs. He returned from Egypt severely wounded and enjoyed a pension in his well earned retirement. Mr. Sinclair has rendered singular and very notable service to Gaelic literature. He has done a great deal of original work; but much more laborious must have been the task of collecting the Gaelic poetry of five hundred years. He published in three volumes of 700 pages "The Gaelic Bards from 1411 to 1715; from 1715 to 1765; and from 1775 to 1835." More recently he published a supplementary volume "Mac-tailia nan Tar." So that in fact he has dealt with the whole period from 1411 to the present time. A volume of "Hymns by John Maclean and others" was published for him by the great Gaelic publishers of Edinburgh. This is a volume of 215 pages. His "Clarsach na Coille" is a book of 271 pages. He did not find his books lucrative; he earned by all his books \$28.14, and he lost \$242.00. But such as Mr. Sinclair's is its own exceeding great reward. There is a pleasure in poetic pains which only poets feel, as Cowper tells; and Mr. Sinclair is a true poet. His labors in connection with Gaelic poetry will prove of interest while Keltic lore is studied. We may remark that Mr. Sinclair's work has been warmly appreciated by Gaelic-speaking scholars within the shadow of St. Francis Xavier's.
