Safety Instruction Car



In its campaign to educate employees in the prevention of personal injuries through accidents, the Canadian National Railways have placed into service a Safety Instruction Car, No. 1520, the first of its kind. The car has a built-in projection room to show sound motion picture films and sound power system operated by a diesel generator to supply power for the projectors and the lighting system. Sixty persons can be accommodated. Following an official inspection at Moncton, N.B., by regional and industrial representatives, who were welcomed by W. E. Robinson, vice-president and general manager, Atlantic Region, the first classes were held, after which the car moved on to other parts of the Atlantic Region which has the honor of being in which this latest addition in the company's safety campaign to prevent accidents will see service. The car is in charge of C. R. Crook, safety inspector, and will be accompanied on its tour of the Atlantic Region by A. A. Chisholm, regional supervisor of safety and fire protection.

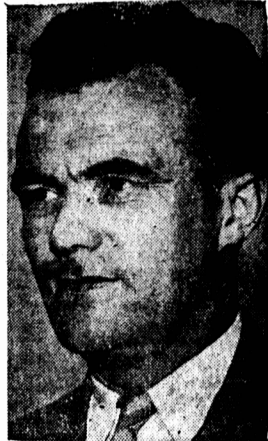

Vegetable VS Animal Food

(Uncle Joe)

Whether it is best to eat only animal food, or try to subsist wholly on a vegetable diet, is the sixty-four-dollar question which has been puzzling mankind ever since Adam lost his Paradise estate.
We learn, from reading history, that large numbers of the human race subsist almost entirely on vegetables, fruits, nuts, etc. The early Romans, Greeks and Egyptians were substantially vegetarians, and they were not lacking in mental or physical vigor. The ancient Greeks were among the best physical specimens of any age. And Romans and Greeks together devised philosophical systems which the world has been following ever since.
In England, an organization known as the Vegetarian Society was founded in the year 1847. To be a member of this society one had to abstain from eating flesh of all kinds. Whether the famous G.B. Shaw is a member, this writer cannot say, but he is a vegetarian.
In Philadelphia there is a sect known as "Bible Christians," who have been vegetarians for centuries. John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, ate no meat. The Brahmins and the natives of India abstain almost entirely from meats, while the Chinese, Swedes, Italians, Scotch and Irish eat much less than we Americans and English do.
Was primitive man a vegetable-eating creature? Did he belong to that frugivorous class of animals represented by the gorilla and the chimpanzee?
There are no concrete facts to support this theory, although many persons have tried to prove that primitive man ate no flesh.
Said the famous naturalist Linnaeus, in speaking of the dietetic character of early man: "His organization, when compared with that of other animals, shows that fruits, nuts and vegetables constituted his most suitable diet."
And Sir Everard Home had this to say: "While mankind remained in a state of innocence there is every reason to believe that their daily food was the product of the vegetable kingdom." Baron Cuvier, who once was considered an authority on comparative anatomy, states that "the natural food of man, judging from this structure, appears to consist of fruits, roots and esculent parts of vegetables."
However, even if primitive man did subsist wholly upon a meatless diet — and this is only theory — we hardly can justify its use in our time. We have become so accustomed to eating meat that we now consider it necessary.
Let us see now what those who favor meat-eating have to say on this interesting question:
"Those nations that use the most flesh, as for example English, are the strongest and most dominant." "Confinement to the use of vegetable food would render man impotent, and thus exterminate the race."
Many more instances could be brought forth, pro and con, and yet we would have neither facts nor figures to prove anything beyond the mere theories of a few men whose opinions, by no means, are accepted generally today.
It is true that the English-speaking nations use a great deal of animal food, and at the same time are the most powerful. It also is a fact that the lowest, and most miserable classes of humanity, such as the natives of Australia and the people of Terra del Fuego, subsist almost wholly on fish and small animals.
But when England was laying the foundation of her far-flung empire, her sturdy yeomen ate very little meat, perhaps not oftener than twice a month. And the Persians, Greeks and Romans became leading nations during a vegetation era.
In the Arctic regions the musk ox, reindeer, etc., flourish on a wholly vegetable diet, while the Eskimo stuffs himself with blubber. It is the lack of other foods that turns people of the North Pole into huge eaters of animals.
So, you see, the testimony of eminent men re the comparative merits of animal and vegetable food differs greatly. The argu-
