

CITY & COUNTRY NEWS

THAT Sydney forms an important centre for the fat cattle of Prince Edward Island, was demonstrated yesterday, when Mr. Ebenezer Wheatley shipped 40 head of cattle to Sydney.

It is not possible to give an idea of the number of boxes of strawberries marketed this summer in Charlottetown. An exchange says:—Nearly 9,000 crates of strawberries found a market in Halifax and Dartmouth this summer—288,000 boxes altogether. The average price the fruit growers received would be about 6 cents at the lowest possible estimate, figuring on which basis the market in Halifax alone was worth in the vicinity of \$18,000 to them this summer. We believe it is possible to sell more and it will likely be found that sales increase from year to year. If the fruit growers in the valley and at other points continue to cultivate the trade they ought to make a handsome thing out of it.

THE hay crop in the different parts of P. E. Island is reported very light. An exchange says: This important crop according to the report Prof. Saunders, is generally light. In the Maritime Provinces it is not likely to exceed two-thirds of an average yield, and in Quebec it is also a smaller crop than usual, except where the land has been newly broken and re-seeded. Many farmers in Quebec and elsewhere keep their land too long in hay to realise the best results. In both Eastern and Western Ontario, the hay is unusually light. At the Experimental Farm at Ottawa, the crop is a good one, although not quite so good as last seasons. In Manitoba and Eastern Assiniboia, owing to severe drought, the hay crop is almost a failure. In Alberta it is reported as generally good. In British Columbia this crop is a heavy one, but rains have fallen so frequently of late that much of it has not been saved. On the whole, hay promises to be scarce and dear over a large part of the Dominion.

THE Department of Agriculture has received a warning from the Experimental Station of the State of Ohio, regarding the operations of a company of men who are pretending to plant orchards for farmers. These men say that the trees are furnished by the Ohio Experimental Station, but the authorities there declare that they have no trees. The planters are believed to have collected several sums of money from farmers in various parts of Ontario, and their clients have been deceived as to the quality of the trees furnished. The Agricultural Department has also received word from Prof. Lunon of the Government Experimental Farm at Mysore, India, inquiring about the manufacture of agricultural implements in Ontario. The natives there are still using wooden ploughs, and some steel ones, which were sent out by the British Government, proved to be too heavy for use. Prof. Lunon says that there is a great opening for a trade in light metal ploughs, machinery in general sells well in the country. Sewing machines have lately been introduced, and have sold well. In a communication from Mr. Harrison Watson, Curator of the Imperial Institute, London, it is stated that several English firms have been inquiring of late for Canadian tallow and grease. Some firms in Montreal are engaged in supplying a portion of this demand, but there is also room for Ontario and Maritime Provinces produce merchants to increase their trade.

WINNIPEG papers record a heavy loss sustained by McDonald Bros. electricians of Main Street Winnipeg on 24th July. Their property destroyed was valued at \$9,000, on which there was an insurance of \$4,000. These gentlemen, who were doing a prosperous business in Winnipeg, were natives of North River, P. E. Island and removed to Winnipeg some years ago with their father, Mr. Donald McDonald. They have many friends on the Island who will regret to learn of the loss they have suffered.

At a meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon Mr. Kirkwood presented the proposition of the Canadian Trade Review to publish and illustrate such information and views as would serve to show forth the city and Island to the best advantage. A committee consisting of the Pres., Vice Pres., and Secy, was appointed to cooperate with Mr. Kirkwood in the preparation of his article.
