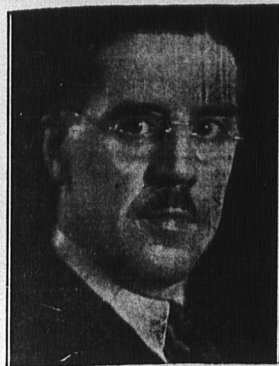


Sales Executives Visit P. E. Island

The many friends of Lemuel Burns were saddened to hear of passing on the morning of May 7th at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Athol Burns, Grafton Street, Charlottetown. Although he had been in poor health for some time, it was thought he was making satisfactory progress, and his passing was a great shock to his family and friends.

Lemuel Burns was born in Charlottetown on March 2, 1910, and lived in this City during the greater part of his life. He attended school here and also Prince of Wales College, in which Institution he had completed his second year. After finishing his college work, he went to work at Hall & Stafford, Charlottetown, where he learned the trade of machinist. He worked at Hall & Stafford for over a year, and then joined the staff of Bruce Stewart & Co. Ltd., where he worked until after the outbreak of the war. Later he went to Halifax where he worked for Purdy Brothers. It was in Halifax that his health broke and he came home to Charlottetown a short time before his passing.

Mr. Burns was married to Flora Margaret Rodd of Charlottetown who survives him. He is also mourned by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Athol Burns and a large group of relatives and friends who will continue to miss one held in high regard by all who knew him and who will be remembered for his pleasant and happy disposition.

The late Mr. Burns was a member of the Charlottetown Baptist Church and was held in high regard by the members of the Church and congregation. The funeral was conducted from the home of his parents on May 9th, by Rev. I. J. Levy of the Charlottetown Baptist Church, assisted by Rev. G.
