Former Big League Hurlers Find Going Tough In Mexico

(By Theodore A. Ediger) MEXICO CITY, May 22—(AP)—Pitchers who formerly hurled in the major leagues are being pounded hard by Mexican League sluggers in several matches without jobs today if they were not protected by contracts.

Washington flinger, the former St. Louis Cardinals pitcher, was hit by the latter in his first game in Mexico City. Vera Cruz Blues released the big Venezuelan, but his salary went on since his contract, as those of other major league pitchers, is not protected by contracts.

The four wrestlers taking part in the two-bout card put plenty of enthusiasm and pep into their actions all during the evening as they piled each other all over the ring with various holds and maneuvers as eye gouging, strangling, kneeing etc., all going to add to the entertainment.

In fact so enthusiastic did Jack Timmins of Windsor, Ont., become in his semi-final encounter that he hurled through the ropes and onto the floor as he missed a flying tackle. He had to call it quits after that.

A Brooklyn mat artist Fred Carone won the main bout taking the deciding fall from Jim Kilonis after weakening him with a series of elbow smashes.

The bull-necked Carone, a veteran of many a mat battle took the first fall from Kilonis at 16:35 whirling him around his head with an airplane spin then following up with a body press. Coming out for the start of the bout Carone quickly assumed the man role and kept instructing Referee Nick Nicholson to watch his opponent while he indulged in some foul tactics himself. Kilonis took exception to the Brooklyn wrestler's repeated hair pulling and gouging and went after him with his left cocked and both men engaged in an impromptu boxing match to the amusement of the fans.

Seeking to win the bout with two straight falls Carone resumed his eye gouging and kept slugging Kilonis when he couldn't see but the Greek grappler quickly countered and went after Carone with his own of which Carone wanted no part and proceeded to hold up the bout until Kilonis lowered his left hand and resumed a wrestling pose. The Chicago wrestler then threw his opponent over his shoulder and took the fall with a minutes of grappling.

The rugged Carone made quick work of the Greek in the final fall pinning his shoulder to the mat at 1:32 after weakening him with elbow smashes.

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, May 22—Lennart Strand, Sweden's strictly amateur roller skater, is coming to the United States this summer to provide the international competition necessary to make the American outdoor track and field season a success.

In addition to his tour, at least two other big international events involving American athletes are on the books for this summer on the coast. The A.A.U. has been invited by Czechoslovakia to send a 4-man team on a tour of Europe in July and August and a dual meet will involve teams of 30 men and six women chosen from the eastern sectors of the two countries.
