596.19, an increase over the previous year of \$1,173.38. The Church Collections and Nurse Fees also exceeded those of last year, while the subscriptions and donations were somewhat less.

One Legacy has been received during the year, \$4,256.92, from the Estate of Mrs. Hannah Roberson, and this added to the \$500.00 received last year from the same source, makes \$4,756.92, which, according to the terms of the will, is to be known as "The Roberson Fund."

During the year, Miss Helena Langslow of Rochester, New York, who had previously shown her great interest in the Hospital by the gift of a handsome invalid's chair, made a further donation of \$238.45 for the purpose of furnishing a room to be known as "The Katharine M. Langslow Room." This is now one of the most beautifully furnished rooms in the Hospital, and the Trustees hope that Miss Langslow's example will be followed by others.

A vacancy on the Board of Trustees caused by the death of Benjamin Rogers, Esq., was filled by the appointment of F. R. Heartz, Esq. Another Trustee J. E. Matthews, Esq., resigned on account of leaving the Province and D. Schurman, Esq., was appointed in his place. These appointments require to be ratified at the Annual Meeting.

Three nurses have graduated during the year—Miss Sarah Elizabeth MacDonald, Miss Winnifred Dobson Schurman, and Miss Olga Victoria Myers.

The Trustees desire to thank the Medical Staff, the Ladies Aid Society, the Collectors and subscribers, also the Clergymen of the different Churches for their services and ministrations.

WIRELESS PROMOTERS ARE SENTENCED

NEW YORK, May 29.—Christopher Columbus Wilson, president of the United Wireless Telegraph company, and four of his associates, were convicted in the criminal branch of the United States circuit court today of fraudulent use of the United States mails to solicit subscriptions to wireless stock.

The sentences which Judge Martin immediately imposed were:—Wilson, three years; George H. Parker and F. X. Butler, two years each in the United States penitentiary at Atlanta.

W. A. Dihal and W. W. Tompkins, one year each in some New York penitentiary.

Following a sensational charge by United States District Attorney Henry W. Wise, that one of the jurors had been approached late Saturday night in the interests of the defendants with the offer of a bribe of seven if it ran into five figures, and the district's attorney's characterization of the convicted men as "desperate prisoners", who would flee the jurisdiction of the court if admitted to bail, he committed the five men to the Tombs prison to-night under a ten days' stay of sentence so that they might if they desired, carry the case to the circuit court of appeals.

In summing up the case at the conclusion to-day of five weeks' trial, the district attorney declared that only \$700,000 out of the \$2,000,000 profit of the United Wireless company in three years went into the treasury of the company.

The sentences which Judge Martin imposed include an addition to the prison sentences, the costs of the trial which amount to over \$50,000.

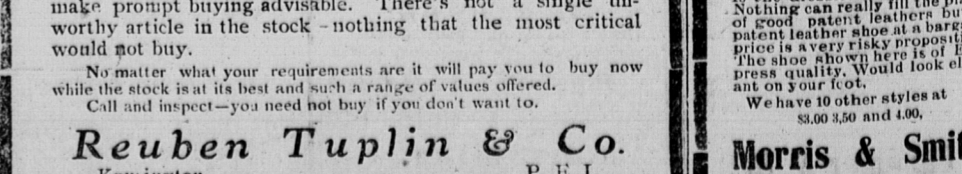
