Oil In Canada's Northwest Territories

OTTAWA, March 6.—Sometimes what seems a prosaic business transaction has behind it a world of romance and high adventure. Such was the case when the Department of the Interior, early in 1933, received from the Northwest Company, Limited, a subsidiary of Imperial Oil Limited, a cheque for the amount of the first royalty payable to the Government on the production of the Company's petroleum well near Norman in the Northwest Territories, nine hundred odd miles from the Canada goose files, north of Edmonton. That slip of paper contained only ten or a dozen words but how much of faith vindicated and work accomplished it revealed. In 1921 the Northwest Company struck a flow of petroleum, reputed at that time to be about at the rate of 100 barrels per day, in what is commonly called the Norman well, situated in the bank of the Mackenzie river fifty-three miles below Norman. The well was completed in 1925 and as there was no immediate local use for the petroleum it was capped to prevent waste.

POUND ADVANCES STEADILY

Closed At \$4.23, French Franc Also Rises.

MONTREAL, March 6.—(C.P.)—Increased demand for the Pound Sterling following United States financial holiday subjected the English currency to a sharp rise in terms of Canadian funds today. From Saturday's closing quotation of \$4.04 the Pound moved up rapidly to a high of \$4.26 at midday. The final figure was \$4.23. The French Franc closed at .048 against its opening quotation of .0476. The Franc was not quoted Saturday.

bonds issued in the United States. It was learned authoritatively that the Belgian Government will pay interest falling due in gold or its equivalent. Gold arivals from Paris, London and Amsterdam in the last 10 days exceeded \$6,000,000.

BERN, Switzerland—The National Bank of Switzerland issued a note saying that contrary to reports the exportation of gold from Switzerland was entirely free.

SHANGHAI—The Tael was quoted at 33 1-2 American cents, against 29 1-4 on Saturday, with small business done.

BUENOS AIRES—Argentina's money basis was shifted from the dollar to the French franc. Several authorities said the value of the paper peso probably would be about 32 or 33 cents in American money when quotations were resumed, as compared with 27 cents last week and with a par value of 44 cents.

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico—Governor Beverley withdrew his own three-day legal holiday proclamation and issued instead President Roosevelt's Bank Holiday order. Bankers conferred with the Governor on plans to conserve cash.

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa—Reacting to the developments in America, gold mining shares on the exchange declined appreciably.

CAIRO, Egypt—The American dollar brought 20 piastres instead of 27 as it did last Friday. The change affected 1,200 American tourists.

LIVERPOOL—The cotton exchange operated, with futures opening 12 points under Saturday, but they quickly recovered half their loss.

VIENNA—The American was getting 20 to 35 per cent less for his dollar.

HAVANA—President Machado issued a decree closing all Cuban Banks and Exchanges.

MONTE CARLO—Gambling casinos refused United States dollars except from old clients who were permitted to deposit dollars and arrange for credit. Tourists were getting about 24 franc to the dollar.

Stream Flow in Quebec

OTTAWA, March 16.—The Dominion Water Power and Hydro-metric Bureau of the Department of the Interior reports that run-off in the province of Quebec during January showed the same characteristics as were observed in December, that is to say, stream flow north of the St. Lawrence was above and south of the St. Lawrence was below normal. These conditions were due to a continuance of mild weather the effect of which upon run-off would naturally be more marked in northern areas. In this area immediately tributary to the St. Lawrence from the north as indicated by the records of the St. Maurice river the natural run-off was about 20 per cent above the January mean, the regulated flow was about 65 per cent above average; in the north of the province the records of the Harricannaw river at Amos indicate a run-off of 50 per cent above normal. South of the St. Lawrence in the Sherbrooke area the natural run-off as indicated by the records of the St. Francis River was about 9 per cent below the January

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, March 6.—A former resident of New Glasgow, N. S., a well-known business man and a prominent mason, Albert P. Strickland died at his home here today aged 42.

For the past five years, Mr. Strickland was connected with the head office of the Dominion Steel and Coal corporation here and previously has been with the same company in New Glasgow. He was a native of Fortune, Newfoundland, and was a member of Philae Temple, Halifax. Masonic burial will take place in New Glasgow.

He is survived by his widow, nee Florence MacLean, his mother, Mrs. Samuel Strickland, of New Glasgow, two sons and two daughters, all of Montreal.

NEW DEPOSITS FOR BANKS

Limited Reopening of Banks Authorized, Subject To Withdrawal Without restriction.

WASHINGTON, March 6.—(A.P.)—Limited reopening of the banks of the nation to accept new deposits subject to withdrawal without restriction was authorized tonight by Secretary Woodin in regulations issued under authority of the President's Bank holiday proclamation.

Under the regulations issued any banking institution which was "lawfully engaged in business of receiving deposits prior to March 6, 1933" may reopen to accept new deposits which are subject to withdrawal on demand without any restriction or limitation.

The Secretary provided that such accounts must be kept separately in cash or in deposit on Federal Reserve Banks or invested in obligations of the United States.

The regulations permit any bank wishing to take advantage of the order to do business on this basis. In issuing the regulation the treasury emphasizes that no relaxation of restrictions otherwise imposed on old deposits was intended.

Commons Approves Of Exhibitions

(Canadian Press)

OTTAWA, March 6.—The House of Commons on a motion by Prime Minister R. B. Bennett, today approved the convention relating to international exhibitions, signed in Paris by the Canadian High Commissioner in 1928. The convention was then ordered sent to the Senate for similar action.

The convention places the establishment and conduct of International Exhibitions, those that are "efficient and nationally recognized," on a uniform basis.

The cost of maintaining the organization governing international exhibitions will be about \$4,000 a year and the nations signatory to the convention will be assessed in the same manner as that followed by the League of Nations.

CHURCH ROOF HAS RICH DEPOSITS OF SILVER

During the search for radium, which has been going on among the hills of Weardale, Durham, Eng., under the leadership of Professor Curtis of Newcastle-on-Tyne, and the Rev. T. E. Espin, vicar of Tow Law, large deposits of silver have been discovered.

It has now been ascertained that the lead that covers the roof and spire of Stanhope church contains as much silver as would pay for rebuilding the whole church.
