For fifteen years The Outlook has made its first of August issue a Special Illustrated Educational Number. The issue for this year is not only remarkable because of the number of eminent educationalists who contribute to it, and the importance of the topics discussed, but also from its general attractiveness as an illustrated magazine. Among the contributors are President Nicholas Murray Butler of Columbia University, President Hyde of Bowdoin, President Harris of Amherst, Dean Jordan of Smith College, Professor George E. Vincent of the University of Chicago, Professor J. R. Wheeler of Columbia, and Dr. Edward Everett Hale.

A VERY special effort is being made to ensure exceptional attractiveness for the Live Stock Features, particularly in Horse Classes, at the St. John Exhibition, 20th August to 6th September next. The Horse is certainly the Live Stock topic of the day, and Grand Daily Parades illustrating the horse requirements of the country have been specially organized. Lovers of Horses will have great opportunities of seeing much to interest them. There will also be a parade of 500 Cart and Team Horses before the Grand Stand on Monday 1st September, Labor Day; and on Tuesday, a great parade for double and single hitches. The judging will be done before the grand stand, the awards explained, and the Prizes awarded.

A FRIEND of the Guardian who spent some time in Venice sends the following item:—Those familiar with the waning glories of Venice will regret to learn that the bell-tower of the famous St. Mark's has come to grief in a short time ago. Accounts say that the bones of the evangelist Mark were brought from Egypt to Venice about the year 820, where the present marvelous cathedral was built for their reception; but whether the church has the great age attributed to it or not, St. Mark's while it stands will hold a place among the sights of the world. In European countries the tower is frequently one hundred feet or more from its church, and the campanile of St. Mark's was about that distance away. To the height of more than 100 feet it was a plain brick shaft without any taper; then followed two storeys of stone each probably 30 feet high, showing very fine workmanship, the tower having an opening on each side of about 16 feet. The remainder of the shaft was probably 80 feet and tapered to a point, the apex terminating in a gilded figure of an angel with partly-spread wings, said to have been over a dozen feet high. The lower section contained eight narrow windows in vertical line for lighting the interior; steps inside led as far up as the opening, an admission of twenty cents being charged. A seat round the base was usually occupied by lepers and beggars. The height of the whole structure is given at about 320 feet; it contained no bell at time of my visit.

12 a. m.—Royal Salute of 21 guns from Fort Edward.
2 20 a. m.—Children form in battalions in their school grounds, and after presentation of medals and flags proceed to City Hall, thence to Victoria Park, headed by Drume, in charge of Captain Stewart, Secretary Trustee Board.
3 p. m.—Formation of Procession on Market Square.
3 15 p. m.—Procession moves off as follows: 4th Regiment, C. A., Lieut-Col. J. A. Longworth commanding; Charlottetown Engineers, Major W. A. Weeks commanding; 2nd Regt., Lt-Col Stewart commanding; Army Medical Corps, Sons of England, Ancient Order of Hibernians, Boys' Brigade, Caledonian Club, R. L. Society, School Board, City Council, Mayor, and officials.
The procession will march along the following streets: Grafton, Pownal, Water, Great George, Richmond, Prince, Grafton, Hillsborough, Kent, to Park.
Proceedings at Victoria Park at 2. 45 p. m.—Arrival of Procession: Troops form in line; Fraternal Societies take up position on north side of Victoria Park; Military Manoeuvres; General Salute; Music by the massed bands; Inspection by D. O. C. Lt. Col Moore; (Troops by the 4th Regt C. A. Band) "Form Hollow Square;" Coronation Ode by 2000 children, etc.
3 30 p. m.—Grand Torchlight Procession of Firemen and Labor Unions with Bands. Officers of Procession Grand Marshal, Captain Goodwill; Assistant Marshal, Sergt D'O.M. Reddin.
Routs of procession—Leave City Hall, Kent St. Pownal, Fitzroy, Great George, Kent, Prince, Easton, Hillsborough, Grafton, Weymouth, Water, then breaking and returning in different directions to the Market Square.
Fireworks, set portraits, etc.
9 30 p. m.—City illuminated. Grand ascent of rockets.
God Save the King.
