Mr. Wm. J. O'Leary Discusses

Island Transportation Problems

Mr. O'Leary is an ardent advocate of better transportation facilities to and from this Province. "With the natural opportunity you have here, it is too bad that you should be tied up with a transportation service which would not be tolerated on the mainland," he said. "I have talked with railway officials and they have given me all their arguments, and I honestly cannot see anything in them. I dread the trip from Sackville to Charlottetown more than any railway journey I have to make and I am sure that this is your great drawback as a tourist resort. I notice some improvement in your service in the last three years—in your passenger cars, for instance; but the delays are still long and tedious, and the changing of cars and luggage on the car ferry is as annoying as it is unnecessary. Only by constantly dining into the ears of the railway authorities will you receive recognition if you complain loud enough and long enough you are bound to be heard. As a matter of fact, the average person in Montreal does not know that such a transportation system exists down here. Informed that there is a modern car ferry in operation across the Straits he takes it for granted that it is a continuous and up-to-date service such as he gets in other parts and after making one visit here and being disappointed, even your attractive advantages of summer climate, landscape and sea-shore will have difficulty in turning him back, because above all things the average tourist hates tedious delays while travelling."

Suggests Relief Crews on Car Ferry

Mr. O'Leary was convinced that the winter service could be greatly improved. Either another car ferry steamer should be provided, or two, or even three crews and captains should be placed on the present ferry so as to provide continuous operation. The wear and tear to machinery would be practically nil. In other place ferry steamers operate continuously day and night and he did not see why the Island steamer should not be able to do this, at least until very heavy frost when ice conditions became an actual menace. He cited New York Harbor as being certainly more dangerous, owing to the enormous traffic, than the Northumberland Straits, and yet day and night this traffic never stops. Searchlights in this case are used extensively and they might be used with advantage here. He excepted the particular occasions when there were severe storm conditions.

Mr. O'Leary is remaining in the Province on business for a few days.

P. Duffus and others making a good showing. The highest scoring fox in the American section was a black male owned by Mr. C. M. Daniels. He scored 94.92 points. On the whole, the American foxes were good but they seemed to lack the show finish that the Prince Edward Island foxes had. This was remarked by the American exhibitors themselves.

The International prizes were awarded as follows: International Grand Sweepstakes Championship, "Cannuck Jane," 96.75 points owned by the Pure Canadian Silver Fox Company, Summerside, P. E. I. This female also won the Grand Championship at Toronto a few weeks ago, scoring 97.75 points there.

International Championship black adult male, "Colonel Silk," 95.25 points, owned by Col. D. A. MacKinnon, Charlottetown, P. E. I.

International Championship black adult female, "Princess Cannuck III," 93.25 points, owned by the Pure Canadian Silver Fox Company, Summerside, P. E. I.

International Championship dark silver adult male, "Bunbury Giant," 96.17 points, owned by Col. D. A. MacKinnon, Charlottetown, P. E. I.

International Championship adult female pup, "Duffus Mildred," 92.67 points, owned by the Duffus Silver Fox Company, New York City.

International Championship dark silver female pup, "Nathan 4th," 93 points, shown by Chas. F. White, Malden, Mass. owned by John A. Lea, Summerside, P. E. I.

The Alaskan foxes, which comprised the third section of the exhibition, were restricted to four entries from each exhibitor. This was a handicap to our excellent breeders Messrs Milligan and Morrison, of Northam, P. E. I., as it prevented them from competing for international honors with the others. Their competition was with J. S. Stierling, the noted American Alaskan fox breeder, and C. M. Daniels who is also a breeder of Alaskan foxes.

Messrs Milligan and Morrison won firsts in every class, scoring a high average, many points in advance of their nearest competitor. Their exhibit attracted a lot of attention and was in splendid shape.

Of the fifteen international championships for which Prince Edward Islanders competed Col. D. A. MacKinnon, Charlottetown won six, Mrs. (Col.) D. A. MacKinnon, Charlottetown, one; Mr. Peter G. Clark, Summerside, one; the Pure Canadian Silver Fox Company, Summerside, four; Mr. Chas. F. White, Malden, Mass. (who exhibited the foxes of Mr. John A. Lea, Summerside) two; and Mr. J. P. Duffus, New York, one. The remaining international championship went to the Marlboro Silver Black Fox Company of Marlboro, U. S. A.

Of the trophies open to Canadians for competition the Grand Championship trophy carrying with it the world's championship was won by "Cannuck Jane," owned by the Pure Canadian Silver Fox Company, Summerside, P. E. I.

The President's trophy which went to the highest scoring fox of the opposite sex, was won by "Bunbury Giant" owned by Col. D. A. MacKinnon, Charlottetown, and bred by Mr. Franklin Boyer of Bunbury, P. E. I.

The New York State Fox Breeders Cup for the best pale silver fox puppy was won by Chas. F. White with John A. Lea's (Summerside) fox "Nora 6th."

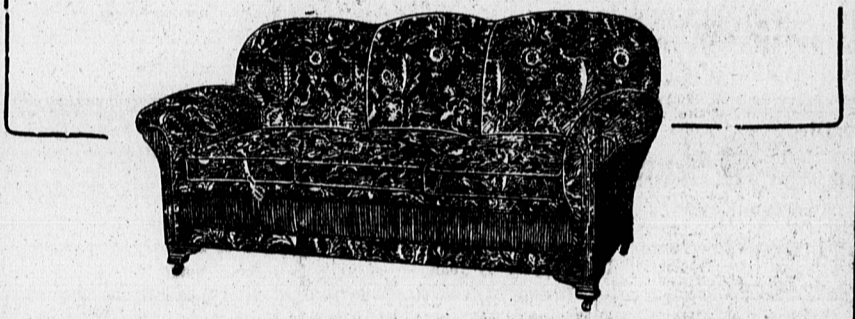
