The Markets MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 5.—The foreign demand for Canadian grain here today was very slow and little business was done. Trading in grain on spot was also of a very limited character, but the tone of the market was steady. The undertone to the spring wheat flour market was again easier but there was no actual change in values. This was attributed to the limited demand from all sources. There was no change in prices for winter wheat flour and the market was inactive. Prices for all lines of millfeed were firmly maintained with an active business passing for local and country account. The trade in standard grades of rolled oats was fair and prices were firm. Owing to the advance of any demand from the United States for potatoes, and the limited demand from other sources a weaker feeling developed here and prices scored a decline of ten to fifteen cents per bag. Car lots of Prince Edward Island whites were quoted at \$1.05 to \$1.10 per bag of 90 lbs. Prince Edward Island green mountains at \$1.05 to \$1.10 per bag in bulk, and Quebec varieties at 90 cents per bag bulk ex-truck. The egg market continued active and firm. The receipts were 719 cases. The tone of the market for beans was steady with a fair volume of business passing.

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 5.—Increasing activity is showing in the poultry market as the holiday season approaches. The Nanapanee poultry far last week prevailing prices were for chickens 26-1-2 cents, turkeys 34 cents, geese, 18 cents; ducks, 18-1-2 cents; fowl, 19 cents.

TORONTO.—The local situation is unchanged with country shippers reporting more increasing receipts. They are paying for extras 50, firsts 48, pullet extras 44, seconds 34, 36, and are making sales at extras 60 firsts 50, pullet extras 48, seconds 38 to 40, f.o.b. cases returned. Brokers here say that they cannot interest buyers in western poultry quotations at present prices.

Montreal—This market is steady with American fresh eggs supplying the bulk of the demand.

Silver Sales of car lots of choice whites and picked on spot were made at \$2.50 per bushel, and car lots to arrive at \$2.60 per bushel ex-track, while broken lots sold \$2.75 per bushel, ex-store. The trade in butter continued quiet and the undertone was easy. The receipts were 280 packages. With the exception of a little business done with United States buyers the cheese market was quiet. The receipts were 806 boxes.
