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ENTIRE FRENCH CABINET MAY RESIGN

Approximately 100 dealers in turnips and potatoes met in the Confederation Chamber yesterday evening at the call of the Provincial Marketing Board. Representatives of all the large shippers organizations, a large number of independent dealers and quite a number of representative farmers were present.

Board Chairman's Address

"Gentlemen,—The Provincial Marketing Board has called together at this time the exporters, buyers and dealers of potatoes and turnips in Prince Edward Island with the idea of effecting improvements in the marketing and price levels of these two products. According to the Natural Products Marketing Act of Canada, either producers or dealers in any natural product, or both, may construct and submit schemes designed for the purpose of improving marketing conditions, and thus assist the primary producer of natural products in securing a more acceptable price for his labor. As the market period for potatoes and turnips is now advanced, the Provincial Board considered immediate action necessary, and as the problem of gathering representative producers together at this busy season seemed a rather difficult one, we have deemed it wise to ask the dealers and exporters to consider the proposal of an emergency scheme for the proper regulation and control of marketing practices in relation to this year's crop. It is our intention, as soon as conditions are favorable, to arrange for a meeting of the producers to discuss this whole question, and, if possible, to arrange for a more comprehensive and complete plan of control. In the meantime we would very strongly urge that in the preparation of any scheme which you may undertake, or in the appointment of any committee or Board arranged by this meeting, representative bonafide producers of potatoes and turnips in this province should have equal representation with yourselves on such committees or board, until such time as primary producers of these products may become organized and arrange for definite action through their accredited representatives. You are, therefore, asked to confer among yourselves, and form some fair marketing plan to become operative with all possible despatch and until a more complete scheme, if necessary, may be constructed.

Elaborate Police Guard For Boy King And Party

Revolutionists Suffer Heavy Loss In Spain

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MADRID, Oct. 12.—(Friday)—Spanish army aviators in Asturias bombed and destroyed a rebel troops train taking men to Mieres and Oviedo to reinforce revolutionists. It was stated today by reports coming directly from the province. It was estimated that the casualties may total 100 dead and injured. The revolutionists on the train were rushing to the centres of active fighting to reinforce the rebels who are being driven into mountain retreats by the forces of General Ochoa and the Spanish Foreign Legion.

MAY FURTHER DEVALUATE U.S. GOLD DOLLAR

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—Private discussion of the monetary situation by President Roosevelt today quickened speculation that he might eventually further devalue the gold dollar to stave off his announced goal of higher prices. A senator Robert Buckley of Ohio, telling reporters on the White House doorstep that he had discussed the currency with the President, declared reluctantly in response to questions that the devaluation was not an "impossibility."

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INTEREST RATES CUT

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HENDERSON REPORTED ILL

LONDON, Oct. 11.—Arthur Henderson, President of the World Disarmament Conference, was reported ill in London tonight. The veteran labor party leader became indisposed during the last week of his visit to the conference at Southampton, and was treated by two doctor delegates. He is now confined to his bed.

Ferguson To Return With Prime Minister

(C. P. Cable) (By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Oct. 11.—Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, Canadian High Commissioner in London, will return to Canada with Prime Minister R. B. Bennett and Prof. O. D. Skelton, Undersecretary for External Affairs, sailing tomorrow. The announcement that Mr. Ferguson would accompany the Prime Minister back caused some surprise in London for Mr. Ferguson returned from his latest visit to Canada less than two weeks ago and there was no previous intimation that he would go back so soon.

HFX. POLICE INVESTIGATE EXPLOSION

Probe Mysterious Blaze Which Claimed the Lives of Six Persons. (C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Oct. 11.—While six victims lay in the city morgue tonight, Halifax authorities proceeded swiftly with an investigation into a mysterious explosion that levelled their home early today and sent flames racing in a holocaust through the tangle of imprisoning debris.

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Political Shakeup Over Marseilles Assassinations; Police Arrest Suspects

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RIOTING IN SECTIONS OF YUGOSLAVIA

No Sign Of Serious Disorder As Authorities Take Necessary Precautions. (C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BELGRADE, Oct. 11.—(C. P. Havas)—Smouldering hatred of Italy, fanned off by King Alexander's assassination, flared at three places in Yugoslavia today as the cabinet, which placed its resignation at the disposal of the new regency, was told to continue in office. There was no sign of serious internal disorder. However, at Zagreb a jeering crowd smashed the windows of an Italian political club.

Successor Uncertain

The veteran foreign minister's successor had not been named and probably will not be until Monday's special cabinet session.

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Eight Hour Work Day Is Proposed

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) SYDNEY, N. S., Oct. 11.—Proposed to adopt an eight-hour working day for all men in the steel plant here was discussed today at a conference between the general works council of the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation and E. B. Paul, Deputy Minister of Labor for the provincial government. The council has been advancing the proposal vigorously and has secured the support of all the steel workers. If an agreement is reached, legislation to make it effective will be introduced at the next session of the legislature.

Total Potato Yield Is Some 47,241,000 Cwt.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Oct. 11.—The total potato production in Canada this year will be some 47,241,000 cwt., greater than last year. The yield of other roots will also be somewhat higher. The crop report dealing with root and potato crops was released today by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Based on a preliminary estimate the total production of potatoes in 1934 will be 47,241,000 cwt., from 580,800 acres, or 83 cwt. per acre, as compared with a revised estimate of 42,745,000 cwt., from 527,700 acres, or 81 cwt. per acre in 1933 and 46,017,000 cwt., from 564,000 acres or 82 cwt. per acre, the average for the five years, 1928-1932.
