No Frauds.
Concerning the charges published of alleged frauds on the part of the liquor interests in the recent plebiscite vote on prohibition, the secretary of state, Hon. R. W. Scott, who has had more to do with the plebiscite arrangements than any other member of the government, states that up to the present no complaints have been lodged here; with the exception of a statement that in some parts of Montreal there was not an adequate supply of ballots in the English language. On investigation it has been established that there was a larger supply of ballot papers, both French and English, than have usually been sent on the occasion of general elections. Mr. Scott is of the opinion that the charges of fraud in the province of Quebec on any large scale are entirely without foundation, and gives as his ground for this belief the fact that the percentage of votes polled in that province is no larger than was cast in Ontario, while in many parts of Quebec the liquor men could possibly have exerted a material influence that would have thrown matters even more in their own favor. Another ground on which Mr. Scott bases his contention is that while in Toronto 50 per cent, or thereabouts, of the total vote on the list was cast, in Montreal, where the liquor men's influence is powerful in many quarters, the total vote cast was not more than thirty per cent. It is the duty of the government to see that frauds have not been perpetrated, and if the ballot has been abused, the guilty parties will surely suffer punishment.

The Horrible Klondike.
That valuable and trustworthy journal the Weekly Sun, of Toronto, to which Professor Goldwin Smith is a contributor, has the following remarks to make about that dreadful drawback to Canada's prosperity—the Klondike: With the approach of winter, the 'male and female' adventurers of the Yukon are flocking homewards, and we are on the point of full knowledge at last. It is now clear that the possibilities of wealth were greatly, even recklessly, over estimated. Ten months ago criticism was silenced by the promise of a yield of fifty millions in the first year. Surveyor Ogilvie, who is responsible for most of the exaggeration which has led to widespread misfortune, stated in a widely-circulated lecture last winter that Bonanza and Eldorado Creeks alone would probably turn out sixty to seventy-five millions. What these and other gold-bearing streams may yet yield cannot be estimated. At all events, the fifty million has not been reached this season. The highest estimate is ten millions, and the probability is, if we can rely on information from British Columbia that the total yield for the season will not exceed four millions. Against this paltry credit we must set a total expenditure for administration, travelling and outfitting which is generally estimated at from twenty to forty millions. We must also set off the unsettling of large numbers of our people, the waste of savings, the loss of labor, the horrors of the mountain passes, and, worst of all, perhaps, if we are to believe current reports, the serious discredit of Canadian administration.

NEW CAPE CABINET.
List of Members and Their Offices
A Capetown despatch says: 'The ministry has been constituted as follows: Mr. Schreiner, Premier and Colonial Secretary; Mr. Merriman, Treasurer-General; Mr. Sauer, Commissioner of Public Works; the Hon. A. J. Heroldt (member of the Legislative Council), Secretary for Agriculture; Mr. Solomon, Attorney-General; the Hon. T. N. Tewater, Minister without portfolio. The new ministry is regarded as a strong combination, and its composition generally approved in Afrikander circles.
The absence of Mr. Ross-Innes and of Mr. Hofmeyer is notable.
Commenting upon the personnel of the Bond Cabinet, a Capetown correspondent says:—'The Progressive split is now healed by Mr. Rose-Innes to-day pledging himself to loyally support the party in opposition. This means that several members of parliament who were returned at the general election as independents will fall into line with the Progressive party. The difference of political opinion between these independents and the Progressives are but few, and are restricted to points in connection with Mr. Rhodes' plans. The Independents of the stamp of Mr. Rose-Innes are for progress, and their accession to the bulk of the party will make the latter formidable in opposition. Previous to Mr. Rose-Innes' pledging his support to the Progressives an article had appeared in the Cape Argus strongly reflecting on his action in deserting the ministry during the recent crisis. The Cape Times however, refused to condemn him unheard.
'At a meeting of the Progressive party this afternoon a course of policy was unanimously decided upon which will compel Mr. Schreiner to introduce this session a redistribution bill' proportionate to the demands of the country as expressed at the general election.
'The Cape Argus says the next turn of the wheel will see Mr. Rhodes back in his old place, taking up the interrupted work of progress, and all the wiser for his mistakes and misfortune.'

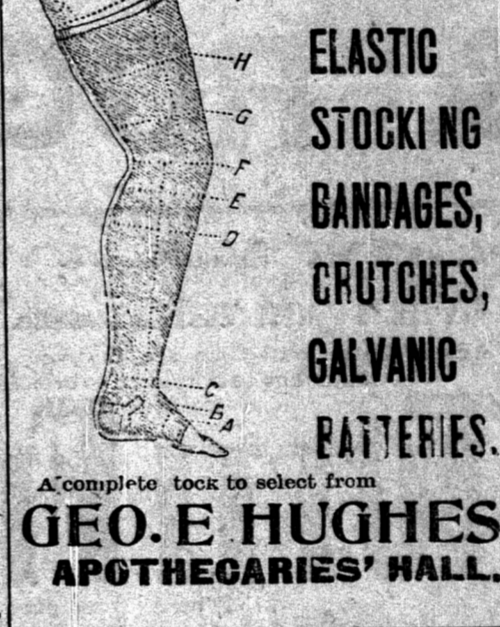

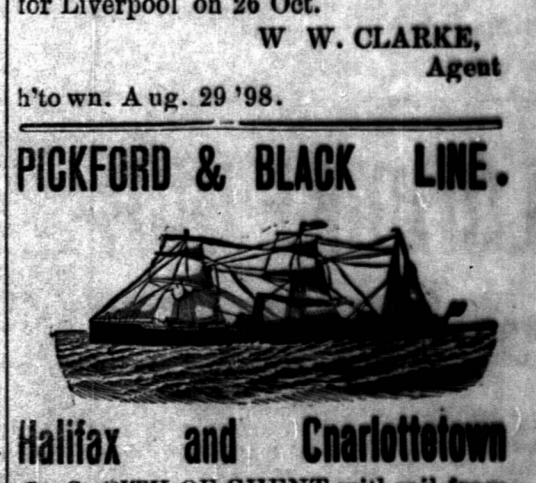
