TURKS AND ALLIES AGREE PEACE TO BE SIGNED

Both Parties Yielded Points and it was Evident at Yesterday's First Session that Agreement was Near.

LAUSANNE, July 9.—An accord has been reached between the Turks and the Allies and peace probably will be signed within a week. For a considerable period the settlement hung in the balance on the question of the Ottoman debt, concessions and the evacuation of Constantinople and other Turkish territory by foreign troops. Both sides were forced to give way in a measure at the end and it was apparent at the first session today that a termination of the discussions was close at hand. It was after several hours discussion tonight that the Allies and Turks reached their accord on all outstanding problems, which have long been threatening to wreck the conference, and, barring unexpected difficulties over minor points, peace should be signed at Lausanne almost immediately. An official communique issued after the session declared that preliminary meetings had succeeded in establishing an accord in principle on the three questions in dispute—the Ottoman debt, concessions and evacuation. An agreement was arranged in the morning, whereby all foreign troops will be withdrawn within six weeks after ratification of the treaty by Ankara. The warships, arms and munitions belonging to the Ottoman government, now in the hands of the allied forces will be restored to Turkey. As to the Ottoman debt, the allies are agreed with the Turks that all reference to the debt should be removed from the treaty. This is a great victory for the Turks, because it means they do not go on record as confirming the obligations of the debt. The Allies, however, will make a declaration before the conference that the debt contracts cannot be modified except by mutual agreement between Turkey and the bondholders. Turkey must try to negotiate with the bondholders some kind of a moratorium for payment of interest, which she is bound to pay in sterling, but wishes to pay in francs. An invitation will be immediately dispatched to the Russian government to send representatives to Lausanne to sign the Straits convention.

Senator W. H. Thorne Aviator Forced To Land Short Of Intended Goal

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, July 9.—Hon. William Henry Thorne, Senator for St. John N. B., died at the general hospital here at one o'clock this morning from a complication of hospital attention for the past six weeks and was in his 79th year. He was a leading worker and member of the Liberal-Conservative associations of both St. John city and the province of New Brunswick, and was appointed to the senate during the Borden administration in 1913. Senator Thorne was unmarried. The death of Senator W. H. Thorne creates the third vacancy in the Upper Chamber. There is a vacancy in the Quebec representation caused by the death of Senator J. Godbout, and one in the Alberta representation resulting from the death of Senator A. E. Forth of Banff. Senator Thorne's death makes a vacancy in New Brunswick.

Grave Criticism Of G. T. R. System

LONDON, July 9.—The London Financial News published a letter from a correspondent who warns share holders of the Grand Trunk Railway that they must first dissociate themselves from the directors committee before they can expect the Canadian Government even to give them sympathetic hearing. The writer in blunt language charges the G. T. R. directors with responsibility for the failure of their railway to make good and in vigorous terms discussed the alleged voting of £37,000 as a special emolument to themselves after the Canadian Government had practically taken over this system.

Charges British With Unfairness To Canada

LONDON, July 9.—The London Canadian Chamber of Commerce charges that the British Government has failed to carry out its agreement with British Columbia to give Canada preference in hops but has instead permitted the foreign exporters to send in hops "undated" which in effect establishes preference for foreign grown hops over Empire hops. The Chamber urges prompt action and remedy.
