EX-Manager Thomas of the Truro condensed Milk factory, is about to proceed to Mission City, British Columbia, to establish a factory of the same nature there. Mayor Stuart, of Truro, is concerned in the business, and there are other capitalists of that place and Halifax interested. The Truro factory has proved a great success.

THE funeral of the late Mrs. John Nelson took place Tuesday afternoon. The services were conducted by Rev. A. F. Browne. The attendance was very large. The death of Mrs. Nelson is deeply regretted by all who knew her and the community loses a true Christian lady. A large family are left to mourn.

SHORTLY after four o'clock yesterday morning the power house at the pumping station was in flames and in a very short time the whole building was on fire. It was found to be impossible to reach the telephone in the building and a messenger was sent to St. Dunstan's College to telephone for the fire department and within fifteen minutes the firemen were at the fire. By the time the firemen arrived the fire had made such progress that the roof had fallen in on the pumping machinery and little but the walls of the boiler, being well protected, was uninjured, and after the fire, steam was found to be on as usual. Both pumps were slightly damaged especially in the rubber joints and packing. There was fortunately a good supply of water in the reservoir. But under the circumstances the supply had to be husbanded. The cause of the fire is not known. A number of machinists commenced work as soon as possible, and the small pump was working at 3 o'clock.

NOTES.

In regard to the report circulated on the streets yesterday morning to the effect that the telephone central could not be rung up to alarm the city firemen. Mr. Reid, the manager, informs us that such is not the case. When the engineer noticed the fire it had too much headway for him to enter the building where the telephone was. He then despatched one of his family to St. Dunstan's College and the central was found inside of three minutes by Rev. Father Monaghan. The young man in charge of the central gave the alarm at once to the police station and the city firemen. The promptness of the firemen in being at the scene of conflagration is certainly commendable. During the day the full police force were ordered to be on hand to patrol the city at night but when the pump was started the order was countermanded.
