TORONTO, Aug. 27.—A tall, smiling German who has been in Canada only a month, tonight held a victory over the Dominion's quarter-mile sculling champion, Joe Wright, Jr., of Toronto Argonauts.

George Von Opel, German amateur champion who now races for the Thames Rowing Club, London, Eng., defeated the former Diamond Sculls holder in the dash event at the Canadian National Exhibition's Regatta here Saturday, bringing himself to the fore in Canadian sculling with his first race in the country.

Von Opel's quarter-length victory over Wright featured a regatta card of 21 races in which national champions in rowing and paddling competed. They were staged over the Henley Memorial course, subject of much debate as to its practicability for championship meets.

DOMINION WRECK COMMISSIONER TO RETIRE

MONTREAL, Aug. 27.—Dominion Wreck Commissioner for more than 20 years, Captain L. A. Demers will retire from the Canadian Civil Service on September 1, it was learned here today.

On August 18, Captain Demers celebrated his 71st birthday. He was favorably known in seaports where his judicial services were required. During his term as commissioner, over 400 investigations were conducted by him and only three of his decisions were altered. Two, it was maintained, were too severe and the other was changed on account of some difference in the nature of its presentation.

Lower Blood Pressure

The instruments showed that the rate of breathing was consistently faster while reading detective stories, and deeper during exciting than less-exciting sleuthing tales, but this speeded-up breathing was on a declining rate, the longer they read the slower it dropped.

Reduces Pulse Rate
"Reading detective stories," Dr. Simpson states, "tends to reduce the pulse rate more than reading academic material. The blood pressure falls to practically the same final level at the end of 15-minute periods devoted to either detective stories or geography. Motor steadiness is improved more by reading detective stories than by reading history.

MISS HELEN JACOBS RETAINS WOMEN'S TENNIS TITLE, U.S.

TORONTO, Aug. 27.—The Barker Gold Trophy, emblematic of the two-mile amateur swimming championship of Canada was back in the United States tonight for the third time in three years. But it was in the possession of a new champion—James Christy, Jr., slim 20-year-old University of Michigan student, who Saturday evening led a class field of 44 to the finishing mark in the remarkably fast time of 47 minutes and 30 seconds.

The fastest time previous to Christy's performance was that of Ray Ruddy, New York Athletic Club natator and winner of the event for 1931 and 1932, who covered the distance in 52 minutes. Toronto swimming authorities doubt, however, whether Christy's mark will be accepted as a new record, due to the fact the course was not tape-measured. Ruddy did not compete this year, withdrawing his entry, along with that of his brother Don, the day before the race.

Some credit for Christy's speedy work must go to 18-year-old Bob Pirie, of Toronto, who splashed along at the winner's heels for the entire distance and finished second, 15 yards back. Rounding the buoy at the mile-mark, Pirie was shouldered to shoulder with his bigger opponent, but the latter increased his pace and gradually eked out a lead which he never relinquished.
