## THE COOK'S CORNER

### PARTY MINDED TEA

3 tablespoons tea  
2 quarts boiling water  
12 stalks mint  
3-4 cup sugar  
Juice of 4 lemons

Method: Place the tea in a large teapot and pour over it freshly drawn and freshly boiled water. Allow to stand while other ingredients are being prepared. Chop mint finely and press into sugar, and then add the sugar mixture to the infused tea. Fill glasses with ice cubes and pour hot tea through strainer into the glasses. Serve at once, garnished with a sprig of mint, if desired.

Food coloring is another beverage that is gaining steadily in popularity. This is really best made by pouring hot, freshly-made coffee over ice cubes, but it may not always be convenient to make it this way, that is, it may suit your purpose better to use regular strength coffee that has been pre-cooled before pouring into the glasses.

### PINEAPPLE SHERBERT

1 cup sugar  
2 cups water  
1 cup pineapple juice  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
1 egg white

Method: Combine sugar and water and bring this to a boil, stirring to dissolve the sugar. Now boil for 10 minutes. Cool. When cold, add the pineapple and lemon juice. Pour into a refrigerator tray, and freeze with the cold control turned to fast freezing. This should freeze to a mush-like consistency. Once or twice while the mixture is freezing, stir it with a spoon, scraping the sides and bottom of the pan well.

When mixture has frozen to a thick mush, turn it into a chilled bowl, and beat until fluffy with a rotary beater. Beat the egg white until stiff and fold into the frozen mixture, then beat for a few minutes with a rotary beater. Turn back into the freezing tray and freeze to the desired consistency.

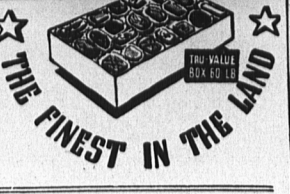
