On Monday, June 1st, 1914, a change will be made in some of the trains on the Eastern Division:

The shock startled the young lad that he fell forward into the "spike" harrows, but fortunately received no more serious injury than a scorched knee. Mr. Jelly who was working in the same field ran to his son's assistance, but the young fellow was able to walk home and now seems quite well after having the earth torn up not more than two feet from where he was standing. Mr. Jelly's loss of a team of valuable horses is unfortunate, especially at this season of the year. It is being remarked that the scene of this accident is but a short distance from the spot where the late Mr. Jonathan Adams was struck and killed little more than a year ago.—O.

INVESTIGATION IN EMPRESS DISASTER

(From our own Reporter.)
OTTAWA, June 4.—The Premier announced in the Commons Tuesday that the Government had received information that the Imperial Government was prepared to assist in the Constitution of a Court of Inquiry into the disaster to the Empress of Ireland. The Bill to authorize the appointment of a special Commission into the disaster was passed by the House.
Hon. J. D. Hazon, informed Sir Wilfrid Laurier that it had not yet been decided whether the commission would meet in Montreal or Quebec and that the date would depend on the consultation with the representative of the British Government who was now on his way here.
The Premier in reply to a question by Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux said that Hon. Geo. Perley was going to England to discuss the Senate representation and to look into the question of a site for the New Canadian Offices.
He would also discuss other matters.
Sir Wilfrid Laurier: "Not Naval Affairs."
Mr. Borden: "As my right Hon. friend is so interested in Naval Affairs, I may assure him that if necessity arise he will discuss that also."
The Premier said it was the intention of the Government to introduce a resolution regarding Senate representation and if that was passed the Bill to increase the Western Representation in the Senate would be unnecessary.
