In such projects, but co-operation is needed more today, perhaps than it was then.

Education A Necessity Education, too, the Minister said, is something which the modern farmer must have if he is to succeed in what is fast becoming one of the most complex businesses in the world.

Among the junior farmers who addressed the meeting were Ralph Rayner, Mount Herbert; William Cairns, Freetown; Donald Anderson, St. Peter's; Lloyd Martin, Cherry Valley; Wallace Harrison, Milton; and Margaret Murphy, Augustine Cove.

All were agreed that, if the young farmers were to stay on the land, social and cultural opportunities must be more abundantly furnished.

Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy-Minister of Agriculture, told the young people he was proud to be associated with such a movement.

Mr. Shaw said he thought the organizing of local groups with a minimum membership of 12 was praiseworthy since these groups would serve as a nucleus through which in the course of a short time the Federation would be able to count its membership by the hundred.

Mr. S. C. Wright, provincial live stock fieldman, said he approved the formation of such an organization by the young farmers. With such a large membership as they would be sure to possess, there would be a better opportunity for the selection of young men to participate in the competitions held by the boys' and girls' club clubs and similar organizations.

Yesterday's meeting had representatives present from Mount Herbert, Bedeque, East Royalty, Dunstaffnage, Augustine Cove, St. Peter's, Cherry Valley, Long River, Lot 16, Cornwall, Milton, Rustico, and Elmira.

It was learned yesterday evening that several other rural centres some as far west as O'Leary and Eremont Bay, are interested in the Federation and that it is expected many new local groups will be formed shortly.

Public Health Nurses Hold Conference

The Public Health Nurses of the Health Division, Department of Health and Welfare, held a staff conference this week at the Provincial Sanatorium, Charlottetown, under the leadership of Miss Mona Wilson, Director of Public Health Nursing.

Plans were made for the rural immunization clinics which will be held throughout the Province this spring, when parents will be offered the triple protection against diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetanus (lockjaw) for their infants and small children. School children will receive protection against diphtheria as in the past.

A refresher course on the venereal diseases was given by Dr. J. H. Shaw, Director of the Provincial Laboratory, and Miss Dorothy Cox, Public Health Nurse, who discussed the latest developments in diagnosis, treatment, and case-finding.

Nurses attending the conference were Miss Mary Leslie, Montague; Miss Elaine Wheeler, Summerside; Mrs. Irene Champion, Tignish; and Miss Ruth Ross and Miss Beesie Beer, Charlottetown.

Planning Rural Beautification Competitions

Rural Beautification Society to sponsor Rural Beautification Competitions in 1948. At a recent meeting of the P.E.I. Rural Beautification Society, headed by Col. E. W. Johnstone, President, it was decided to sponsor the Rural Beautification Competitions similar to those of 1947.

Schools, Homes - First and Second Year, will be included again, but Community Halls will not enter into this year's program. Regarding School Competitions, it was decided that, inasmuch as the Grants from the Department of Education provide the incentive for School Improvement, the Society would limit its financial contribution to the extent of providing Trophies for the winners in each County.

It was announced by the President that the Government Grant for this year would be \$2500. The report of the Committee consisting of Mr. G. C. Warren and E. D. Reid, appointed to secure appropriate pamphlets and other instructive materials for contestants and general distribution, was heard.

A pamphlet entitled Beautification of Home Grounds, including information from several publications of the Division of Horticulture, Ottawa, specially applicable to island conditions, was approved. Regarding the awarding of prizes, a representative of the Spray Painting Company, Mr. Brine, who told the Society that his company is sending a power paint-spraying unit valued at \$3,500, to the Island this summer.

It was the unanimous decision of the Society to provide the contest between the company and the contestants in this year's competition who wish to avail themselves of the above facilities. Full particulars of the arrangement would be advertised through the press on the announcing of the 1948 program, which would take place on April 20.

Art Centre Response In Charlottetown

In talking to the School Improvement League members at a meeting Thursday evening, Miss Frances Johnson said that the Art Centre in Charlottetown had received 40% more response than any other place known to her. Her talk consisted of a general picture of the aims and work of the Centre and she said that in her estimation, the Centre here could be shown as an example and an inspiration to other organizations.

Miss Johnson described art as "school for learning" and efforts were made to help the children to their social problems and to give guidance. Attempts were made to help each child individually and to help them towards self-discipline. The programs for the last six months has been chiefly experimental, but said Miss Johnson, she felt that the children who had attended were a very representative group. Child development was emphasized as being the whole background of the work. Throughout the talk Miss Johnson showed her understanding of young children and their difficulties.

Appreciation was expressed at the pleasant rooms loaned by the I.O.E. and also to the City Council and the Kinsmen for financial help. Paintings and interesting animal figures were displayed, including a miniature ski run complete with figures and skis that showed considerable ingenuity. Members kept Miss Johnson busy

The Central Guardian In Memoriam

MR. NEIL MacCANNELL

A host of friends were saddened and shocked to hear of the death of Mr. Neil MacCannell which occurred suddenly in the early evening hours of Sunday, March 7th after only a few days illness, borne with Christian fortitude and patience. The final summons came quietly and peacefully.

The late Mr. MacCannell was born in Long Creek, P. E. I., the 26th March of 1883 the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Duncan MacCannell of the same place. He received his primary education at Long Creek School later gaining his teacher's certificate at Prince of Wales College afterwards teaching at New Argyle, Nine Mile Creek, Cornwall, Canoe Cove and Argyle, Shore. Mr. MacCannell was in the teaching profession for 23 years and in addition managed a general store at Canoe Cove where his general disposition added to the long list of friends, in 1929 he accepted a position as Clerk of the County Court in Charlottetown and with the exception of a short period held this post until the time of passing. Strict attention to business and his trustworthy character made him a popular employee with Court officials who deeply mourned his passing.

Church, home and society suffered loss in the passing of Mr. MacCannell. In the home he was a devoted husband and loving father while as a member of the Presbyterian Church in New Dominion at which he rose to the position of Elder, the Church later becoming the United Church he was a faithful devoted attendant always ready to help in any cause for Church betterment and leading an exemplary Christian life. He was a member of the order of Free Masons for a long number of years and was also a prominent member of Derry Orange Lodge, having the distinction of being created an Honorary Member shortly before his demise in recognition of the many valuable services he rendered to the Society.

Mr. MacCannell was married to Katie Martha MacGregor in 1911, his wife predeceasing him in 1943. Out of the union three children, two sons and one daughter, were, Edith (Mrs. Fred MacPhail) of Argyle Shore; D. Archibald of Charlottetown and Wendell of Montreal, P. Q. One brother also survives, Mr. Duncan MacCannell of Canoe Cove.

The funeral took place from Trinity United Church on Wednesday afternoon, March 10th and the large attendance from both city and country testified to the high esteem in which the deceased was held. Services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. T. E. McLennan who spoke in glowing terms of the life of the deceased and speaking comforting words to the bereaved relatives. Hymns sung were "Abide With Me" and "For ever With The Lord". Mr. George Johnson of Trinity United Church choir rendered feelingly "The Old Rugged Cross" a particular favorite of the deceased.

The body was then taken to New Dominion Cemetery for interment where Rev. Mr. McLennan again officiated at the grave. His remains being laid beside those of his wife there to await the resurrection morn.

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The ranking officer, Brig. W. C. D. Knappott of Gen. Robertson's personal staff, said he did not expect any trouble passing Soviet controls. He said he had orders not to allow any Russians aboard.

Thirty-four American planes flew food and passengers into Berlin during the day. British officers at Gatow Airport in the British sector of the city said special flights brought supplies and passengers from Western Germany there today.

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(Also, British officials confirmed that Soviet fighter planes had dived at and dived British planes coming through the 30-mile wide corridor along which they fly to Berlin.)

The Russians further hamstrung four-power government here by announcing that they were curtailing their participation in the Kommandatura, the four-power governing body that rules Berlin. The Russians said they were withdrawing from seven important committees including those on communications, transportation, economics and public welfare. They asked that the work of the committees be merged with others.

(Col. Yelizarov, Russian delegate, asserted at a Kommandatura meeting that the Western Powers had "robbed and plundered Berlin," taking 1,000 tons of copper, 1,000 tons of aluminum and a printing plant, Reuters reported.

By word and act she ever strove to benefit the many with whom she came in contact. No one ever left her general presence without being better physically or spiritually for the sojourn with her. Only in Heaven will the true extent of her charity be known.

Her funeral which was very largely attended was held from her home, 52 Upper Queen Street, to the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer, Requiem High Mass was conducted by Reverend W. Mann, C.S.S.R. Services at the grave were conducted by Reverend M. C. Coll, C.S.S.R.
