**Cross of Sacrifice Unveiled in Halifax**  
 (Canadian Press)  
 HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 12.—Representatives of the British War American War mothers and Canadian Federal and Provincial Governments, as well as scores of Canadian Societies, participated Monday in the unveiling of "The Cross of Sacrifice" erected recently by the Imperial War Graves Commission on the foreland of Point Pleasant Park, at the entrance to the North-west Arm. Vice admiral Sir F. L. Field, commander of the British special service squadron, The Hood, repulse and Adelaide, now in port here, unveiled the cross which is dedicated to the memory of those members of the Royal Canadian Navy Volunteer Reserves Canadian Expeditionary forces and Canadian Mercantile Marine, who lost their lives at sea, either by enemy action, disaster or illness, while serving in the Great War.

 away, they were forced to abandon the settlement. The most probable site of the martyrdom of the Jesuit missionaries, Fathers Breffault and Lalonde by the Iroquois in 1649 at the Mission of St. Ignace near the present town of Midland, Ontario, was marked by the erection of a cairn and tablet. At Port Dover an article commemorating the possession of the lands of the Lake Erie region by the Sulpician priests, Dollier and Gallene, on March 23, 1670. On the east side of the Niagara boulevard, near Chippawa, a tablet was placed on a monument provided by the Niagara Falls Park Commission, to commemorate the Battle of Chippawa, July 5, 1814, between Canadian and American troops. Immediately adjacent to the Niagara boulevard, near Brantford, a tablet was placed on a monument erected by the Niagara Falls Park Commission to commemorate the action of Frenchman's Creek, Nov. 28, 1812, between the Canadian troops and the American invaders. Four miles east of the town of Welland, the tablet at Cook's Mills, October 19, 1814, was commemorated. At Niagara-on-the-Lake the Battle of Fort George, May 27, 1813, was also marked. On the Mountain Road, near Thorold, the Battle of Beechwoods, or the Battle of the Cheneaux, was also commemorated. At Sault Ste. Marie a cairn and tablet were erected to mark the first Sault Ste. Marie Canal, surveyed by the Northwest Fur Company in 1797. Fort Wellington, Prescott, constructed in 1812-13, as the main post for defence between Kingston and Montreal, has also been taken over for preservation. The interesting Gleggery Cairn, situated on Monument Island, in the St. Lawrence river, opposite the village of South Lanark, and erected by members of the General Militia who took part in the suppression of the Rebellion of 1837, in honor of Sir John Colborne, commander of His Majesty's forces in Canada at that time, has received necessary repairs.

**Rome Building Houses For Jubilee Pilgrims**  
 (Associated Press)  
 ROME, Aug. 12.—The Eternal City has generally taken eternal long to make those alterations which her increasing size and growing population render necessary. Now, however, she has drawn up a program of improvements which, if half of it is carried out, will transform Rome from an old-fashioned, somewhat disorganized city, into a modern capital. These changes will be made between now and next January, the beginning of the Jubilee Year.

**Manitoba:** In Manitoba, Fort Prince of Wales, situated at the mouth of the most northerly fortress on the Hudson's Bay Company from 1733 to 1747, has been placed under the general protection of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and steps have been taken to protect the relics from further damage and decay.

**Saskatchewan:** Fort Livingstone, covering an area of 960 acres, has been reserved with a view to the creation of a national historic park at a subsequent date. Fort Livingstone was the first capital of the Northwest Territories in 1876-77, and there the first session of the Northwest Council was held.

The funeral was held on Monday the 11th, from his late residence, conducted by Rev. G. T. Spriggs, of Kensington, where a large number gathered to pay their last tribute of respect to one who will be greatly missed in the community. He was ever ready to lend a helping hand to any in time of need. His remains were laid to rest in the family plot in Irishtown cemetery. The pall-bearers were Messrs. John, David, James and Russell Adams, William Colley and Hugh Campbell.

**Advertising Makes Free Press, States Advocate Of Peace**  
 (United Press)  
 LONDON, Aug. 12.—A free press and international peace as a result of advertising were urged by Edward A. Filene of Boston, prominent peace advocate, in an address delivered before the international advertising convention of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World.

Newspapers everywhere, the speaker said, free from the control of "special interests," will be responsible for the peace of the world. Big advertising, it was contended, "tends to make the press independent and thus enable the editor to go straight" in his search for facts and truth.

The cost of publishing the modern newspaper, Mr. Filene explained, far exceeds the returns from circulation, or the price paid by readers and subscribers. Six million dollars a year—more than a million pounds—has become a very ordinary figure, he said, for "producing a great daily in our large cities."

"It is clear, therefore," he continued, "that the press is under an ever-increasing necessity of meeting competition by enormously expanding the sources of its revenues." Additional revenues are obtained by a "free press," he explained, principally by means of advertising. Those newspapers that are not "free," he declared, may obtain their additional revenues from "special interests." "In the long run," he warned, "there is no single factor more threatening to world peace than a press controlled by 'special interests.'"

Big advertising, the speaker said, might not always overcome the influence of "special interests" on the press; and on occasions and over short periods of time, big advertising itself might attempt to control newspaper policy.

"But in the long run big ads can be paid for only by big sales," he pointed out. "And big sales will not come unless readers have confidence that the paper can be relied on for its news and editorials."

"Big advertising is not an economic waste," the speaker continued. "It is a social service. It is more than that. It is the basis of a press that is financially free. It is the fundamental factor upon which depends the ability of the press to furnish facts disinterestedly, and thus promote the out-
