Miss McMillan is establishing information bureaux in the towns of the province with the purpose of having all children needing treatment sent to the ward and thus to keep up interest in it all over the Island.

The establishment of a reformatory and industrial school, Miss McMillan thinks would be a good thing for the province. A number of children who would be cured or helped by the treatment they receive could go there instead of going back where they came from.

Miss McMillan has the certainty of the approval of her enterprise by the people of this province, and we have every reason to believe that the project will receive the support of our citizens. The subject is one that should receive an exceptional degree of public support from those living in all the towns and villages that make up our metropolitan district.

The situation of the hospital is one of the finest that we have in the provinces. The Architect will provide everything needed, and the beneficences of our citizens in all that is required.

When completed the children's ward in the P. E. I. Hospital will become a place to which mothers can take their children, confident that they will not be submitted to any unnecessary pain.

For its inauguration Miss McMillan deserves the congratulation and commendation of the entire community.

Mr. G. F. Beer has manifested his interest in the project by contributing the handsome sum of \$60 to the furnishing of the ward.

ALASKAN BOUNDARY

Canada's Position is Strictly Defined.

AGREED TO ARBITRATE

Parcel Post Customs Order Affecting Preferential Tariff Goods.

OTTAWA May 29.—[Special]—In view of the English papers reproaching Canada for blocking the international Conference by demanding a port in Alaska, the Canadian government authoritatively denies that any such proposal has been made by Canada.

She has agreed to an arbitration of the whole Alaskan question by a separate tribunal.

A customs order will prevent postmasters delivering preferential tariff articles by parcel post under \$25 value, and not for sale only even if accompanied by a certificate of manufacture.

THE PILOT'S STRIKE.

One Pilot Deserts and Takes a Ship Out—More Trouble Feared.

CHATHAM, May 29.—(Special)—George Sirov, pilot, deserted his striking associates and piloted one of the belated ships to sea.

Others followed close after and all got out safely.

The general feeling against pilot commissioners is so strong that a general labor strike through sympathy with the pilots is feared.

French Iceland Fishermen.

HALIFAX, May 28.—The Newfoundland authorities are keeping a sharp eye on the French fishermen on that coast, causing them to kick strenuously about the price they are charged for bait. The Icelandic fisheries attract a number of small vessels from the north of France, mostly sailing craft, which leave in the first half of March. It is proposed to improve this industry by fitting out some small, but strong steamers for it, also a larger boat to transport fish to France. These fishing craft, being also equipped for trawling, would not lie idle during the winter as is generally the case with the Iceland fishing boats, but could commence trawling off the French coast immediately after their return from Iceland.

NO HOPE FOR 'PARIS'

The Tugs have Failed to Move the Liner.

EFFORTS DISCONTINUED

Proposed to Concert Some New Plan of Lightening the Ship.

FALMOUTH, May 27.—Another supreme effort to float the Paris was made this evening, but resulted in failure. Six tugs were made fast to the steamer by steel hawsers and anchors were put out astern, the chains from which were attached to the steam winches on the steamer and it is stated the propellers of the Paris were then driven at full speed astern but the efforts were unavailing. After an hour's straining the main hawser broke and the task was abandoned until to-morrow evening. The hope of floating the Paris is growing faint.

COVERACK, Cornwall, May 28.—The ninth attempt to float the American line steamer Paris was made this evening and proved an utter failure. Her bow is absolutely impaled on the rocks. Five tugs were used in the endeavor to tow her off, three others standing by for an emergency. Her boilers, excepting those used for the pumps, were employed to lighten the ship. The effect of the strains increased the water in the engine room. Efforts to pull her off will now be discontinued and it is proposed to concert some new plan for lightening the vessel.
