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### NOTICE TO LANDLORDS AND TENANTS OF COMMERCIAL ACCOMMODATION

Concerning Term Certain Leases Expiring May 1, 1945

1. If the landlord of any commercial accommodation now occupied by a tenant wishes to occupy the accommodation himself on May 1, 1945, he should immediately apply to the Rentals Office of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board for permission to give notice to vacate to the tenant. Such notice to be effective must be given before February 1, 1945.

Any notice from the landlord that may have been given prior to January 2, 1945, refusing to renew the lease is null and void. Any such notice given subsequent to that date without the permission of the Rentals Appraiser is likewise null and void.

2. Landlords of tenanted commercial accommodation who, before January 2, 1945, have entered into a contract to give vacant possession thereof on May 1, 1945, to a third party, should apply for clearance to the Rentals Office of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

3. With effect January 2, 1945, no well-behaved tenant of commercial accommodation can be required to vacate without permission of a Rentals Appraiser of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, or without a clearance from the Rentals Administrator, which permission or clearance will be granted under the following circumstances:—

- (a) The landlord desires the accommodation for his own personal occupancy for a period of at least a year;
- (b) The landlord desires the accommodation for purpose of demolition or major alterations;
- (c) The landlord desires the accommodation in order to convert it into housing accommodation;
- (d) The landlord has prior to January 2, 1945, entered into a bona fide contract to give vacant possession of the accommodation to a third party.

### Expect Revival Of Agreements On Emigration

LONDON, Jan. 12 — (CP Cable) The British Government, facing criticism from ex-servicemen for information on the prospects for emigration envisages a revival of various pre-war agreements with the Dominions for migration by individuals but does not plan any mass migration scheme. It was learned reliably today.

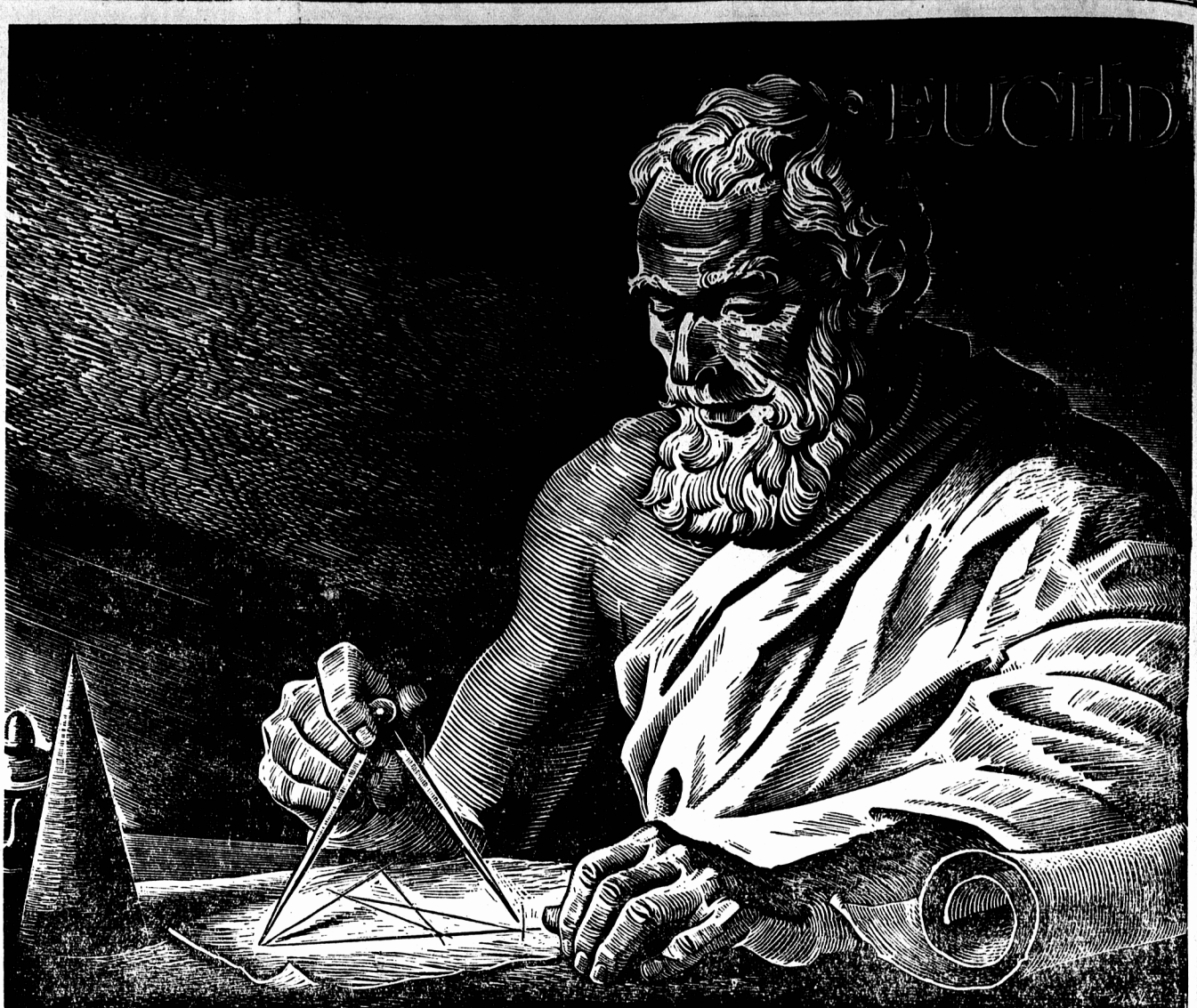
This source said the Government was "very anxious to get ahead" on immigration talks with Canada and other parts of the Commonwealth. The Dominions Prime Ministers meeting here last spring held a general discussion on the immigration situation but no definite decision was reached. Since then a committee has been set up to study specific problems involved.

One of these, for instance, is what can be done to free foreign exchange to emigrants so they can be self-sufficient while getting established in their own new homes. Another is deciding when there could be widespread loosening up in issuance of labor exit permits. Both these are purely domestic matters for decision by British authorities.

A reliable source said today the British Government had no intention of discouraging immigration. There are some Britons who have said the country cannot afford loss of population before "reconstruction is well under way but it is understood the official view is to the contrary.

Institution of Dominion-United Kingdom talks in immigration is being left to the Dominions. The British Government feels that most directly concerned are the countries to which the people are going. When these talks are held one of the matters to be worked out is how to ensure that Britons leaving this country do not lose their credits built up over the years in British social security schemes.

### U. S. Plans Spurt In War Production

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12 — (AP)

A "second-wind" production spurt scheduled for early 1945 was announced today by J. A. Krug, chairman of the War Production Board.

Part of it will go to equip newly formed French Army units. Civilian production of equipment requiring essential materials "will be reduced to a dribble."

Half of all munitions programs must rise 65 per cent, on the average, over the 1945 estimates which were set last fall. Mr. Krug told a press conference. "Hot types of planes, including superfortresses, and jet-propelled fighters, will go up three-fold by June.

War Production Board and the armed forces now are scheduling about \$2,500,000,000 worth of new weapons and supplies, which will bring total 1945 armament output to about \$64,500,000,000, somewhat higher than 1944, Mr. Krug said.

"There will be plenty of jobs for everybody in war industry," he asserted, adding that the apprehension of workers last fall over possible layoffs "can now be dispelled."

Tanks, trucks, planes and weapons for divisions of the French Army now being formed for service with the Allies against Germany, account for part of the new increase, Mr. Krug said, but he would not state how much of the \$2,500,000,000 increase is aimed for France.
