THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Feb. 9.-There was no further change in the local egg situation today, but the undertone to the market continues easy on account of the liberal supplies coming forward and still lower prices are expected in the near future. The demand is steady for small lots, and a fair trade is passing in a jobbing way in new laid stock at 65c to 68c per dozen. The receipts today were 968 cases, as against 326 for the same day last week, and 150 for the corresponding day a year ago.

The condition of the market for dressed poultry today was unchanged, the feeling being very firm under a steady demand for supplies for immediate consumption, and a fairly active trade was done in cold storage stock. The demand for all arrivals of fresh-killed stock is also good and the market is kept well cleaned up daily.

We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows: Turkeys, choice 68c to 60c Good turkeys 54c to 56c Geese 30c to 36c Chickens 40c to 42c Chickens 40c to 42c Ducks 38c to 40c Fowls 33c to 35c

The trade in potatoes is quiet on account of the fact that buyers in most cases are well supplied, and in consequence the undertone to the market is easy at the recent decline noted, with car lots of Green Mountains and Quebec stock quoted at \$1. to \$1.05 per bag of 90 lbs. ex-track, while in a wholesale jobbing way sales were made at \$1.30 to \$1.40 per bag of 80 lbs. ex-store.

Chicago, Feb. 8.-Big receipts of eggs today forced prices down 6c a dozen, wholesale. Today's receipts were the largest this year, 17,028 cases. Including today's fall in prices, the Chicago market showed a decline of 11c so far this week, with the grade known as ordinary first commanding 30c to 31c wholesale.

Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 8.-Wholesale egg prices dropped 6c a dozen here today, carrying the price for the first grade down to
