Saints Meet Mt. A. In Series Opener Today

Coach A. J. McAdam and his stars will leave this morning for Sackville, N. B., where they will cross sticks with the Mount Allison University hockeyists in the opening game of the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island intercollegiate championship series at Allison Gardens at 7:30 tonight.

The game will be the first of a home and home series with Mount A. and University of New Brunswick for the two-Province intercollegiate hockey title.

Saints' first home game of the series will be played at Allison Gardens on Monday, February 6th, against U. N. B.

Although the Saints won't be appearing until the game lineup has been seen in action here in Lunenburg, intercollegiate competition, due to the fact that some of the teams are ineligible for intercollegiate play, they will nevertheless have a formidable opposition in many of their regulars, including their stalwart young goaltender, Frankie Strain, who has been turning in very smart performances here this season.

The boys will be leaving by special bus from the University at eleven o'clock this morning and will make their return to the Province the same night. It is understood that a few seats on the bus will be available to local fans and supporters who wish to make the trip with the team.
