## DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Parl-Mutual betting at harness horse race tracks will be legal in Maine this season. That will make quite a difference to the racing plans as the Maine horsemen are quite speculatively inclined.

Harness racing will get under way at the Black Diamond race track, New Aberdeen, C. B., the 24th of May, with a Free-for-All race. The race will be a Free-for-All race for all trotters as attractive as any to be seen. It will be a half-mile match race between two old time favorites, Lumber, Todd and Pale Face. The following are expected to start in the Free-for-All: Hunter Hedgewood 2:04 1-4, Major M. 2:07 3-4, Flo Abbe 2:11, Im. Alons 2:09, Joe the Great 2:12-1-2 and King Sam 2:10. Calumet Budlong 2:02 3-4 will give an exhibition mile.

Alderman E. Frank Lordy has been appointed Secretary-Manager of the Provincial Exhibition, Halifax. He will work in conjunction with A. W. McKinnis of the Department of Agriculture, in an effort to produce a banner exhibition. It is the hope of the new management to utilize the grounds frequently during the summer in an effort to make more revenue and show a profit or at least cut down the deficit which past years have shown. Mr. Lordy is well liked and should be successful. We have not heard what the plans are in regard to harness racing this season.

Commenting on the probable starters in the Free-for-All at Charlottetown this autumn we neglected to mention Hunter Hedgewood 2:02 1-2, owned by Frank Holmes, Glace Bay, N. S. The reason that we did so is that we understood the Hedgewood horse had been sold to parties in Quebec. Our horsemen friends will remember what a grand race Hunter Hedgewood went in the Free-for-All at Charlottetown last August.

In the second heat which Toll Gate won in new record time of 2:05 3-4, Hunter Hedgewood finished 1-4 right at Guy the Tramp's side. It was separately timed in better than 2:07. We hope Mr. Holmes will have a splendid season with him.

Calumet Budlong 2:02 3-4, recently purchased by Mrs. Charles Ballard, has been entered by her in the \$2,500. Free-for-All which will be raced at Rutland, Vt., in September. He may also start at Malone and Essex Junction.

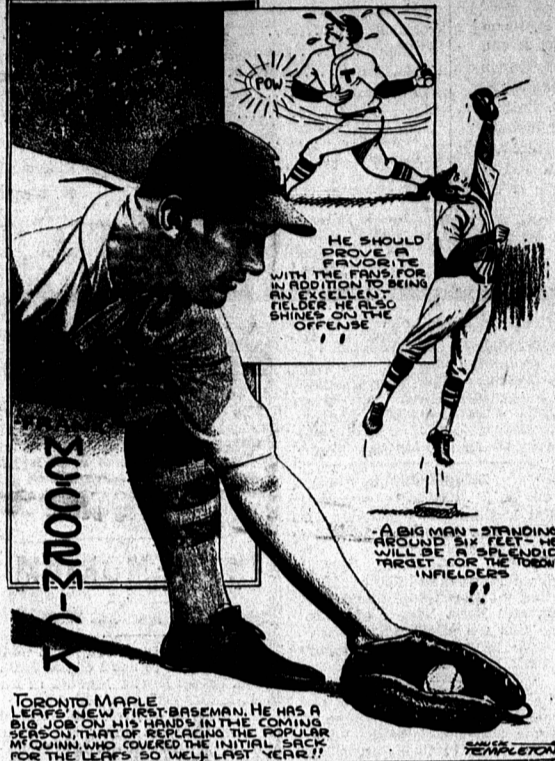

**Pittsburg Pirates Blank St. Louis Cardinals 3-0; Phillies Trim N. Y. Giants**

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, April 19—Rockie Darrel "Cy" Blanton subdued St. Louis Cardinals with a masterful one-hit pitching achievement at Pittsburg today and led the Pirates to a brilliant 3-0 triumph over the World Champions.

Only a solitary single off the bat of catcher Virgil Davis in the second inning prevented the 27-year old right hander from registering a no hitter and entering baseball's hall of fame. Backing up Blanton's superb hurling, Pirates batsmen bunched five singles off southpaw Bill Hallahan to score all their runs in the third inning. Cookie Lavagetto opened the attack with a hit, and Tommy Padden, Paul Waner, Babe Herman and Arky Vaughn did likewise.

**PHILLIES TRIM GIANTS**  
The Phillies hit four Giant pitchers with everything in sight to chalk up the biggest score of the new season as they trimmed New York 18-7 at Philadelphia.

## KELLEY WINS BOSTON A.A. MARATHON

**Irish Speedster From Arlington, Mass., Wins Handily—Canadians Have Little Luck.**

By Bill King, Associated Press Sports Writer (By Guardian's Special Wire) BOSTON, April 19.—Although he gorged himself with the equivalent of 16 hearty meals as he ran, Johnny Kelley, 27-year-old Irish speedster from Arlington, Mass., finished a quarter-mile ahead of his most dangerous rival, Pat Dungs of Baltimore, today to win the 38th annual of the famous Boston A. A. marathon.

This torturous 26 miles, 285 yards grind over the steep hills that range from Little Hopkinton to Boston was never anything but a contest between the victor and the runner-up, despite the presence of six former winners and two score of famous plodders in the starting field of 190.

### MADE GOOD TIME

Kelley's time was 2:32:07 3-5, just 65 4-5 seconds slower than the course record set by Leslie Pawson of Pavtucket, R.I., in the 1928 race. Dungs was clocked in 2:34:11 4-5. Dick Wilding, the seasoned Canadian distance star, of the York Athletic Club, Mount Dennis, Ont., finished third in 2:39:50, the same position he gained two years ago. Gordon Norman of Beverly, Mass., seventh in last year's race, finished fourth in 2:40:57 2-5. Kelley crossed the line in front of the B.A.A.'s clubhouse was the pinning of the German-American A.C. New York, in 2:44:37 1-5.
