Amerks, Red Wings And Bruins Win Games As Leafs And Chihawks Draw

NEW YORK, Nov. 14—A pair of third period goals gave New York Americans a 2-0 victory over Montreal Maroons here tonight in the home opening of the Americans' 15th National Hockey League season.

A crowd of 15,000 persons saw the teams battle through two periods of fairly fast and rugged hockey without either side threatening very seriously to count.

Jack Shill, one of the three new acquisitions of the New Yorkers, opened the scoring near the half way mark of the first chapter when he barged through the Montreal defence to tally. Maroons turned on the heat in the closing minutes trying for the equalizer and the Americans broke away for the clinching marker. Nels Stewart got the nod with the aid of Joe Jerwa.

A brief fist fight between Hookey Smith of the Americans and Jerry Shannon of the Maroons enlivened the second period. Smith was given a major penalty. Twelve other minor sentences were meted out during the game.

Earl Robertson, new American acquisition, hung up his second shutout in three games, as the greatly improved home club tended him fine support throughout.

PLAY DRAW

CHICAGO, Nov. 14—Chicago's Black Hawks and the speedy Maple Leafs of Toronto battled to a 3-3 overtime tie tonight in a thrill-packed National Hockey League battle before 13,000 fans.

A goal by Johnny Gotseligg, half-way through the third period, enabled the Hawks to gain a measure of revenge over the Leafs for the 7-3 victory scored by Toronto Saturday night.

The game, a well-played affair from the start, was marred by only two penalties.

Boll started the Leafs on their way with a goal early in the initial stanza, with help from Thoms. A few minutes later March, with Broomes sliding him the pass, slapped the puck past goalie Walt Broda to knot the count.

In the second period Charlie Conacher, getting the puck from Horner, caught the Hawks flatfooted down the ice and whipped the burner which put the Leafs in front again.

In the third stanza, Earl Selbert, burly Chicago defenceman, drove a long shot from the line which escaped Broda's eye and again the score was tied. Conacher got his second goal of the game, scoring after Thoms had stolen the puck from Gotseligg. Then Gotseligg's rebound and with Davidson in the penalty box for boarding Selbert, sent the game into a comparatively dull overtime.

RED WINGS HIT STRIDE

DETROIT, Nov. 14—The champion Detroit Red Wings, showing flashes of the form that led them to the Stanley Cup last season, defeated Montreal Canadiens 2-1 here tonight for the first Detroit victory of the current National Hockey League season.

Veteran Hec Kilrea's goal at 2:22 of the third period broke a tie and gave Detroit its winning margin, but it was the neat stickhandling of Charlotte's Pete Kelly, until recently an alternate forward, that kept up the score. Kelly broke through the Canadian defence on right wing and laid a short pass on Kilrea's stick right in front of goalie Wil Cude.

The triumph evened the Red Wing's record with Canadiens who whipped them 5-2 at Montreal last night.

Detroit had to come from behind tonight after George Mantha winged the first goal on a long drive out of a mass of players on left wing. The puck bounced off goalie Norm Smith's glove into the nets at 5:44 of the first period.

When Red Goupille made his second trip to the penalty box for hooking Wally Kilrea in the second period, the Red Wings powered to tie it up. They rained pucks at Cude and finally Johnny Sorrell shot it in from 40 feet on a screened drive.

BRUINS DEFEAT RANGERS

BOSTON, Nov. 14—Boston Bruins ran up a three-goal lead on the New York Rangers and then barely stayed off a powerful third period rally for a 3-2 win tonight as they made their first home appearance of the National Hockey League season.

A crowd of 15,000 saw the Bruins run up a 3-0 lead during the first two periods. The Rangers countered twice during the last frame.

The Boston tallies were caged without assistance by Bobby Bauer and M.E. Schmidt during the opening session, and by Bill Cowley, former Montreal Halifax Wolverine, early in the second frame.

Rough Riders Gain Berth In Playoff

MONTREAL, Nov. 14—(CP)—Tiny Herman and the Ottawa Rough-riders booted their way through mud and rain Saturday to defeat Montreal Indians 9-5 in Ottawa and gain a berth in the Interprovincial Rugby Football Union playoffs.

Riders, as a result of their victory, will meet Toronto Argos Saturday in the first of a two-game total point series for the league championship won last year by the Ottawans. Argos defeated Hamilton 18-5 in Toronto to end the season in first place, four points ahead of Riders.

In the Intercollegiate Union, Queen's downed University of Toronto 3-0 in Kingston and University of Western Ontario beat McGill 4-0 here. Results of the games left Queen's in first place by one point and forced a second-place playoff between Western and Toronto.

The Ottawa game was played under the worst football conditions ever experienced in that city. Rain fell throughout the game and most of the final period was played in semidarkness with automobile headlights needed to break the gloom.

Big Abe Elowitz booted Montreal to a 5-0 lead in the first quarter, but Herman, former Halifax Wanderer, kicked a field goal and a single and Rocky Rocano five singles to give the Ottawans their victory and a playoff berth.

Canadiens Display Old Form Defeating Red Wings 5-2; Leafs Trounce Hawks 7-3

MONTREAL, Nov. 14—(CP)—The Flying Frenchmen flew a-gain last night as Montreal Canadiens defeated Detroit Red Wings 5-2 for their first National Hockey League victory of the season.

With a burst of speed reminiscent of the days when they were winning Stanley cups, Canadiens came from behind a two goal deficit late in the second period to score five goals without a reply four of them in the final 20 minutes.

Victory gained before 5,500 fans who braved a stormy night, gave the Montreal team second place in the League's Canadian section, while Red Wings, slow in rounding into the form that carried them to a world's championship last season, remained in the United States division cellar.

A series of minor infringements that saw three Red Wings and one Canadian go to the penalty box inside of a minute and the delayed penalty rule brought into use led to Canadiens' first goal late in the second period after Herbie Lewis and Marty Barry had given Detroit the lead.

Babe Siebert started a rush while his team had a one man advantage and a three-way passing play between the big defenceman, Armand Mondou and Johnny Gagnon ended with Mondou flipping the puck past Normie Smith.

Little Aurel Jollat tied the score three minutes after the third period started on a backhand shot off Paul Haynes' passout and speedy Georges Mantha won the game three minutes later when, his golf swing directly in front of the goal connected.

The last two goals were scored late in the period on break-aways from five-man Detroit attacks. Gagnon got the first and Lorrain the second.

The game was played at burning speed from start to finish. Lewis' first period goal, a rebound off Barry's shot, came after the fast breaking Wings tore loose from a four-man Canadian attack.

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CONACHER COUNTERS THREE

TORONTO, Nov. 14—Toronto Maple Leafs and Chicago Black Hawks took up in Chicago tonight where they left off here Saturday night when Leafs drubbed Bill Stewart's men 7-3 in the first game of a weekend National Hockey League doubleheader between the teams.

Leafs, registering their second victory in three starts, fired three goals within two minutes in the first period while Hawks were a man short. They had an easy time protecting the lead in a game studded with 11 penalties of which Leafs drew eight.

The Leaf attack was highlighted by Charlie Conacher's first scoring spree of the young season. The big right winger shot three goals before a crowd of 12,300.

Johnny Gotseligg was serving a penalty six minutes after the game opened when the Leafs put on their rapid-fire scoring act. Harvey Jackson drilled home the first one, Conacher the second and Moncton's Gordon Drillon, the league's present scoring leader, the third.

Pete Palangio fired the first Hawk goal and Cully Dahlstrom sandwiched one between counters by Conacher and Jackson in the second period. Conacher's final tally came before Mush March counted for Chicago and Nick Metz for Toronto in the third period.

The game saw Red Horner start along the path that has won him the N. H. L.'s "bad-man" title. Red took three penalties and was matched by a defence mate, Bob Davidson who got three in the last period.

Alabama & Pitt Still Undefeated

NEW YORK, Nov. 14 (CP)—United States football's exclusive undefeated club has lost a couple of charter members, Duke and Nebraska, but the boys still are looking for the combination that will stop Pitt and Alabama, twin-powerhouses of the east and south.

Nebraska, tied twice but previously undefeated, led Pitt as late as the fourth period Saturday but ultimately fell victim to the customary Panther late finish 13-7. Duke, with only a tie with Tennessee to mar its record, found itself badly outplayed by North Carolina's Tarheels and lost the game 14-6.

Meanwhile Alabama, rated with Pitt and Fordham as outstanding Rose Bowl contenders, withstood Georgia Tech's early assaults and pushed over a fourth quarter touchdown to win 7-0 and remain undefeated and untied. Fordham was idle.

A terrific downpour couldn't keep 78,000 people from sitting the Yankee Stadium game as Notre Dame, capitalizing on an early break, downed the army 6-0.

Yale spilled Princeton 26-0 and remained undefeated. Dartmouth likewise remained unbeaten but had to come up with a late rally to tie Cornell 6-6.

Lafayette's surprising leopards tripped Washington and Jefferson 6-0 to remain the east's only major undefeated and untied eleven. Holy Cross protected its unbeaten record with a 7-0 conquest of Brown.

In the big ten Minnesota pushed over Northwestern 7-0, and remained the only team unbeaten within the conference. Ohio State easily won from Illinois 10-0, but Indiana had to fight for its life to get past Iowa 3-0.

California, unbeaten power of the far west, turned loose a 20-point spurge in the second quarter and coasted to a 26-0 victory over Oregon. Stanford, preparing to meet California next week, pounded out a 23-0 triumph over Washington State as Washington spilled University of California at Los Angeles 26-0 and Southern California played a 12-12 draw with Oregon State.
