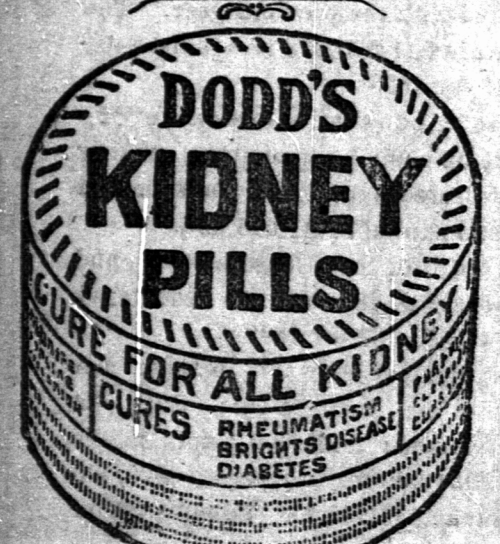

### THOSE WHO DID NOT VOTE.

Hon. Mr. Mills, the Minister of Justice in discussing the plebiscite vote in the Senate, is quoted as saying that the vote on 29th September "differed from an ordinary election vote as it was intended to discover the sentiment of the country. Were the people who did not vote not to be considered?"

It is wearisome to confute again and again a fallacy which is thus set up again and again as often as it is knocked down. It is well known that when there is any question upon which people are called to vote, those who are free to vote and do not choose to exercise that privilege have, always, till now, been held to consent to the decision of the voting majority. The fallacy of the government's contention is that it virtually counts the non-voters at the plebiscite as if they had voted with the minority.

We have shown that in the Commons twenty members constitute a quorum and in the Senate fifteen members. In the one case less than a tenth part of the total membership and in the other case less than a fifth part may carry on the business. Thus eleven men voting in the Commons may carry a decision when there is only a quorum present. Those who are absent are construed in every case as consenting to the action of the majority of those who were present. It is the same in all our elections civic, provincial and federal. It is the same in all organized societies, and has been so from the beginning of popular voting. Surely we had a right to assume that it would be the same in regard to the plebiscite. To count the non-voters as opposed to the action of those voting in the majority is simply without precedent, contrary to all established usage, and entirely revolutionary. No one knows all this better than Hon. Mr. Mills.

The government position is therefore wholly indefensible. But we think the opposition have greatly failed in the premises. The mandate of the people we hold to be not only binding upon the government of the day, but would be also binding upon their successors if Sir Wilfrid and his colleagues were to-day turned out of office. So far as we have read, the opposition leaders fail to realize this particular feature of the situation. They do not claim that if they were in power they would obey the people's mandate and pass a prohibitory law. In fact they have made it clear that they would not do so.

If Sir Charles Tupper and Mr. Foster had taken up the prohibition banner, and shown a willingness to carry out the mandate of the majority, the days of the Laurier Government would have been numbered. But Sir Charles and Mr. Foster have done nothing of the sort. This attitude on their part is to-day the government's sole bulwark against the disappointed prohibitionists. The latter would readily become a party of punishment if by so doing they could see a clear prospect of obtaining prohibition. Without any such prospect they will not, as a body become a party punishment.

The Greenway government has been in power in Manitoba during eleven years. Mr. Greenway became Premier in January in 1888. The time is drawing near when a general election must be held, and the electoral lists are to be at once revised in preparation for that event.

An Ottawa paper speaks of the long debate on the address in the Commons as "a go-as-you-please talking match in which voluble members talked to empty chairs and a few weak-minded people in the gallery."

We are only beginning to realize the enormous development of our Pacific ocean trade. The tonnage of ships inward and outward from British Columbia ports last year reached the big total of 3,713,884 tons. The tonnage entered and cleared in the same time at the Montreal and Quebec centres amounted to 3,247,460 tons, or nearly half a million tons less.

The Queensland government is spending a large sum to induce agricultural immigrants from the British Isles only to settle in that country, by giving them free passages out. Halifax Herald argues that this is much more patriotic than the Canadian importation of Doukhobors, Galicians, Mennonites, &c. Something might also be said in favor of making British subjects of aliens and foreigners as we are doing.

The following from the St. John Sun is a reminder that we do some things better here than in New Brunswick. We quote:

In the P. E. Island legislature this week, tenders having been called and received for printing the journals of the house, the result was reported to the house and the lowest tender accepted. Our Hon. Mr. Tweedie and Mr. Emmerson should be invited to Charlottetown to teach those Island legislators the correct modern method of getting public printing done. To ask for tenders and especially to accept the lowest is ridiculously old fashioned.

The first division in the House of Commons this year, which took place on the motion respecting the alleged mismanagement of affairs in the Yukon, gave the Laurier government a majority of 53. The total opposition vote was but 48, or five less than the government's majority. In other words the government now controls practically two-thirds of the membership of the Commons. Since that division the election in Brockville has taken place, further swelling the government majority.
